EATING WITH BRITISH ROYALTIES

(These are just our modern Meringues.)

In the old days when the fear of poison was never absent from the minds of kings and queens, the serving of tentations was attended by the following ceremony, at Court banquets where they were in evidence. The chief Lady-in-waiting, at the conclusion of the meal carried the tentations on a dish to her Sovereign and chief guests, but before offering them she took "a faire cloth" which she also carried to the Royalties who wiped their hands and mouths, then she kissed the cloth in token of faithfulness and presented the little white cakes.

This is a recipe for the cakes which are popularly known as "Kisses" to this day. Take the whites of 4 eggs, beat till stiff, then slowly cast into them one cup (cup) and a half cup (cup) of the finest white sugar, mix in lightly, then fill a tablespoon with the paste, smooth with another spoon to an egg shape, as quickly as possible, and drop each about two inches apart, on strips of stiff white paper. Sift a little sugar over each, and bake in a slow oven till light brown. Cool a little then pass a thin knife under each, scoop out a portion of the soft part and replace in oven to dry. Before using fill hollow with whipped cream and put two together.

TO MAKE A LEMON DRINK.
Liked by the King William and by the Queen Adelaide.—Victoria, June 2nd, 1855.)

Take ten good large lemons, pare very thinly, steep them in one gallon of very good brandy, covered closely, for 3 whole days. Then take three pints of water and boil it with 2 pounds of extra refined sugar. Skim and squeeze in the juice of 6 or 8 lemons, then put it to the brandy and stir well together, and strain through a jelly bag and bottle. Then cool and place in a draught to get quite cold, covering it well to preserve the flavor of the brandy.

A CORDIAL

2 quarts of spring water; 1 quart of brandy; 6 Lisbon lemons; 1/2 lb. fine sugar.

BRIDAL CAKE

(This cake was made for the private use of Queen Victoria, on her wedding day.)

To two pounds of sifted sugar, (loaf) add four pounds of fresh butter, four pounds best white flour, and 1/4 oz. each of ground mace, cinnamon, and nutmeg. Thirty eggs, four pounds of cleaned currants, 1 lb. blanched and pounded Jordan almonds, 1 lb. citron peel, 1 lb. candied orange peel, and 1 lb. candied lemon peel, all cut into slices, and 1/2 pint of good brandy must also be added. A pint may not be too much. First work the butter to a cream with the hand, then beat in the sugar for 15 minutes, whisk the whites of the eggs to a stiff froth and mix them with the sugar and butter, then beat the yolks for 15 minutes, and add them to the mixture, and likewise the flour, mace, and nutmeg, and beat all well together till the oven is ready. Then mix in lightly the brandy, currants, almonds, and sweetmeats. Line a hoop with buttered paper, fill it with the mixture, and bake it in a brisk oven and when risen cover it with paper to keep it from burning. Serve it cold or plain.

Note.—I fancy this is a sort of home-made wedding cake of Queen Victoria, for she had far more magnificent wedding cakes made by the royal cooks. But it makes this one all the more interesting. It is known that Queen Victoria hated rich recipes, so it may be that she had a less rich wedding cake made for her own private consumption and edification. Anyhow, this is the recipe for a bridal cake as entered in her book.

PLUM CAKE

(From the Royal Cook Book.)
To 7 lbs. of currants and 4 lbs. fine flour, 6 lbs. of the best butter, and 2 lbs. of blanched Jordan almonds pounded and mixed with orange flower water, and 4 lbs. of eggs, but without whites, 3 lbs. finest sugar, 1/4 oz. ground mace, 1/4

THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, Que., Jan. 11.—While there was some enquiry from foreign buyers for Canadian grain on the Montreal market to day, exporters stated that the price bid were all below a working basis and no new business of importance was done. The only important sale in the domestic market was two loads of No. 1 northern wheat at 11 1/2 cents per bushel over the Winnipeg May option, C.L.F. by ports.

In oats the following was steady under an improved demand from country buyers. A weaker feeling developed in the spring wheat flour market and prices were reduced twenty cents per barrel. Winter wheat grades were unchanged. Prices for all grades of milled were well maintained under a fair demand. The movement of standard grades of rolled oats was fair and prices were steady. A fair volume of business was transacted in the egg market and prices for storage and fresh grades were steady. The butter and cheese trade was inactive but firm.

OTTAWA, Jan. 11.—The Toronto market remains firm today but Montreal has undergone another price decline. Heavy production in the East and consequent lack of markets is placing the British Columbia market in a very disorganized state.

Toronto jobbing firm, specials 50, extras 45, firsts 42, storage extras 43, firsts 40, second 32.
Montreal it is believed the price decline is overdue and that there should be a temporary reaction soon. Jobbing fresh extras 43, firsts 38, storage firsts 35, second 28.
Winnipeg prices to country shippers are unchanged. Jobbing fresh extras 50, firsts 47, second 33, storage extras 46, firsts 36, second 28.

Edmonton egg market easy heavy receipts and slow demand is causing prices to drop. Dealers are quoting country shippers delivered extras 30, firsts 28, second 25. Poultry market firm, receipts from country points almost all.
Calgary egg receipts sufficient to supply demand, extras 35, firsts 32, second 28, storage stocks low, jobbing second 37.75 per case.
Vancouver paying country points extras 30 to 32, firsts 28 to 30. Jobbing extras 36, firsts 34, second 30, pullets 30.
St. John, N. B. jobbing extras 53, firsts 48.
Charlottetown, P. E. I. whole sales paying country points extras 45, firsts 40 second 35.
