Two Steamers Sunk in Indian Ocean by Raider

CANBERRA, Australia, Nov. 27 (AP) — Navy Minister W. M. Hughes announced today that the merchantmen Port of Brisbane and Maimoa had been sunk by an enemy raider operating in the Indian Ocean.

An Australian warship brought 27 survivors of the Port of Brisbane to an Australian port and other survivors were taken prisoner aboard the raider.

Nothing is known of the Maimoa, except that an empty lifeboat belonging to her was found and it is assumed she was lost.

The raider, which was not identified in the Navy Minister's statement, came upon the Port of Brisbane in the darkness and when about a mile away suddenly flashed searchlights on the merchantman and opened fire.

The first shells struck the bridge, damaging the navigating equipment and soon afterwards the wireless equipment was dismantled, but not before a distress call had been broadcast. The message was heard in Australia.

The raider abandoned the vessel in lifeboats. Occupants of two boats were captured while 27 in three other boats escaped in the darkness.

A boarding party from the raider placed time bombs on the crippled Port of Brisbane and when the bombs failed to destroy the vessel a torpedo was fired into her side. The raider made off before the merchantman finally sank.

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Australia's Income Tax To be Increased

SYDNEY, Australia, Nov. 27 (CP) — Legislation was introduced into Parliament today to increase steeply Australia's income tax as part of the Commonwealth's plan to finance her war effort.

While incomes which hitherto were not taxed would be affected only slightly by the new measures, incomes ranging from \$500 to \$2,000 (from \$177 to \$710) would be taxed heavily.

A married taxpayer with one child who previously paid \$6 on \$500 now pays \$25. A taxable income of £1,000 pays £18 compared to £35 previously; £1,500 pays £27 compared to £35; £2,000 pays £30 compared to £34.

State income tax in the highest taxed states is about the same. The personal exemption scale rises from one shilling in the pound on a taxable income of £100 to five shillings on £1,500. Excess income over £1,500 pays 10 shillings there after.

The tax would be deducted weekly by employers beginning Jan. 1, 1941. The majority of the states also collect their income tax in this fashion.

Iron Guardists Take revenge 64 killed

BUDAPEST, Nov. 27 (AP) — Under a new law, Rumanian Iron Guard was reported to have executed 64 political opponents in the corridors outside their cells in Bucharest's Jilava prison early today. Scores more were arrested.

This bloody revenge for the slaying of their founder, Corneliu Zelea Codreanu, and 13 of his followers in November, 1938, was said to be the first step in a series of reprisals against the Iron Guard.

Nevertheless, Premier Ion Antonescu was believed to have concluded that a turbulent situation because of the presence of German troops in Rumania, and the recent demobilization of the army.

Dispatches from Sofia said the Rumanian government had reported he had called an extraordinary session of the council of ministers tonight.

Through a censorship that has been strictly enforced, Rumania has been unable to reveal since last midnight grid details of the purge were received by telephone via German and Hungarian legations in Bucharest.

NEW YORK, Nov. 27 (AP) — All communications with Bucharest were cut off tonight, the British Broadcasting Corporation announced in a broadcast here, the National Broadcasting Company.

Several hundred unidentified legionnaires drove into the forest near Jilava, about 2 a.m. today, and shot 64 men.

They forced their way into the yard of the prison which lies in the foothills of the Transylvanian mountains, overpowered guards and seized keys to the cells.

Moving swiftly and surely, they unlocked the cells one by one and as prisoners stepped out into the dimly lit corridors, they were shot down.

All those executed were friends of the regime of King Carol and had been in jail awaiting trial since the Iron Guard seized power in September, forced Carol to abdicate and turned Rumania to an alignment with Germany.

Those reported executed included former Premier Gen. Argeseanu, Gen. Gabriel Marinescu, former minister of security Gen. Moruziu, former chief of the military intelligence, who was credited with building up the elaborate espionage service of King Carol; Radu Pascu, former president of the supreme court; and the former gendarme commander, Gen. Bengliu.

Former premiers Ion Gigurtu and Constantine Argetonanu, were among those reported arrested.

Dismissing last chief of Carol's military council, also was said to be under arrest.

Codreanu and his followers were killed during their imprisonment on charges of treason growing out of the assassinations of premier Ion B. Duca, in 1933, and Mihail Stelescu, an Iron Guardist, accused of betraying the movement in 1936.

PENTWATER, Mich., Nov. 27 (AP) — A. E. Christofferson, chief boatswain's mate in command of the Ludington and Pentwater coast guard stations, said today he had left efforts to rescue the stranded Canadian freighter Novadoc in the hands of subordinates after the Nov. 11 storm on Lake Michigan.

Christofferson testified in a court guard hearing into the circumstances surrounding the rescue of 17 men from the freighter by the fishing tug Three Brothers, operated by Clyde Cross. He said he arrived at Pentwater shortly after the rescue had been effected. Two men were lost.

The officer said he did not know if coast guards had done everything possible to rescue the seamen, but added that had he been at hand he "would have had a surfboat on the water on the 12th, ready to go, instead of the 13th of November."

British Boys tell U. S. Scouts of War

In a two-way radio conversation between New York and London, four American and three British "Boy Scouts" discussed scouting in war conditions in a program broadcast by the National Broadcasting Co. The British youths explained their defense duties.

Replying to a question asked by one of the American Scouts, Robert Praver, 15 years old, of 142-25 231st Street, Laurelton, Queens, Dennis Edwards, a London Scout, declared, "Most of the younger boys have been evacuated, you know, but the rest of us serve as messengers for the firefighting services during and after air raids, carrying messages on bicycles, telephoning and doing whatever jobs we are called on for at the moment."

The British boys were particularly anxious to know, they said, whether the American boys had encountered any of their friends or fellow troop members who have been evacuated to this country. Hugh McPee, 13, of 919 West End Avenue, told the London scouts that an evacuee had become a member of his troop, number 500 of Manhattan. The British boys put aside the prepared questions before a long evening to ask if their American friends had enjoyed Thanksgiving. "We are still functioning," one of the British scouts declared, "but not as we did before 'Jerry' with his blitz started all the trouble."

Proctor Child, 14, of 167 South Oxford Street, Brooklyn, asked the British group what part of scout training had proved most valuable in the home defense service. Eric Young, one of the London boys, replied, "All of it." Bobby Harris, 13, of 63 Fort Greene Place, Brooklyn, told Stanley Newton, patrol leader of the London Bulldog Patrol, that he had visited Canada during the past summer and that there he had met a number of Canadian and evacuated British scouts.

Seated at a table in a closed studio in Radio City, the American boys and their British counterparts asked or replied to questions returned. The American portion of the program was under the direction of John W. Vandercok, news commentator, who sat at the table with the British boys.

The American portion of the program was arranged by the Boy Scout Foundation of Greater New York.

Rothermere's Funeral held

HAMILTON, Bermuda, Nov. 27 (CP Cable) — Lord Rothermere, who amassed one of Britain's greatest published fortunes, was buried simply today in a Bermuda graveyard at 2 p.m. after a service from home.

The 72-year-old financial genius, who, with his brother, founded a great chain of newspapers and periodicals, was buried in the presence of only a few persons after a short, unostentatious service at St. Paul's church in Paget parish.

Lord Rothermere died in hospital here yesterday. He lasted only a few minutes, as did the committal at the graveside. No hymns were sung.

The grave was piled high with flowers, ordered by cable from many parts of the globe.

Chief mourners were Esme Harmsworth, Lord Rothermere's granddaughter; Harry Morrison, a former director of Lord Rothermere's associated newspapers, and George Honour, his masseur.

Governor Sir D. J. C. K. Bernard was represented by Lieut. Frank Giles, his aide-de-camp.

News Briefs

SOUTHAMPTON, Nov. 27 (CP Cable) — Dr. Russell Thomas, National Liberal, today was returned unopposed to the House of Commons for Southampton to fill a vacancy created by the elevation of Sir John Reith to the peerage. The by-election was not contested in accordance with the wartime truce among the political parties.

OTTAWA, Nov. 27 (CP) — Post Office authorities, commenting on a report from London today that letter and parcel mails from Canada posted between Oct. 18 and Nov. 1, had been lost, said they presumed the mail was lost aboard the Canadian steamship Beaverford.

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 27 (CP) — The American Federation of Labor passed a resolution today expressing fervent hope and prayer that Great Britain will win in its war with the Axis Powers. The resolution was similar to one passed by the British labor unions in London last week.

OTTAWA, Nov. 27 (CP) — Canada's trade mission headed by Trade Minister MacKinnon en route to the West Indies and South America will leave Ottawa Friday.

OTTAWA, Nov. 27 (CP) — The Canadian Broadcasting Corporation in its annual report for the fiscal year ended March 31, 1940, reported income of \$3,752,061 and expenditures of \$3,498,071 leaving a net operating surplus of \$253,990. Licence fees provided \$2,906,605. Other income was given as \$795,967, including \$700,867, miscellaneous \$94,485; and a grant for the Royal Visit of \$47,440.

OTTAWA, Nov. 26 (CP) — Donald W. Buchanan, director of public affairs broadcasts for the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation has resigned, it was learned today. His resignation was accepted by Mr. Buchanan, native of Lethbridge, Alta., joined the CBC Feb. 1, 1937.

TORONTO, Nov. 27 (CP) — If present conditions continue, Ontario farmers will be forced out of production of some essential products such as bacon, D. E. Stauffer of British Ont., president of the United Farmers of Ontario, said in an address prepared for delivery at the organization's annual convention here today. "We cannot produce it (bacon) at present prices and meet our financial obligations," he said. "Some people are saying 'I hope the farmers will be loyal enough to keep on producing pork products in spite of the price.' This attitude is economically unsound and absurd."

Britain offers Friendly hand To Bulgaria

LONDON, Nov. 26 (AP) — Britain offered a friendly diplomatic hand to Bulgaria today, promising that if she would stay neutral this country would do its best, when peace comes, to assure her future independence.

The overture was made in the House of Commons by under-secretary R. A. Butler, who submitted this written statement on behalf of his chief, Viscount Halifax, foreign secretary.

Lord Halifax welcomes this opportunity of stating that provided Bulgaria does not join or assist, either actively or passively, the enemies of Great Britain, or attack her allies, it is the intention of His Majesty's government to do their best to ensure that in any eventual peace settlement to which Great Britain is a party the integrity and independence of Bulgaria shall be fully respected.

The reference to Britain's allies clearly was to Greece, whose troops are fighting off the Italians now but are facing the possibility of another stronger axis thrust through Bulgaria.

It followed by only a day the disclosure in Berlin that Bulgaria — considered previously as an imminent sign of peace — was expected to sign at present.

This offer of a British guarantee to Bulgaria illustrated the concern felt by British strategists over the possibility of a pincer closing upon the Balkans from the east. The British are near a major battle with two major battles at once — one in the vicinity of the British base of Matruh and the other in Palestine.

Bulgarian Students In demand for War

SOEFA, Bulgaria, Nov. 27 (AP) — Hundreds of demonstrating university students called tonight for an immediate fight against Greece and Yugoslavia for recovery of Macedonia.

Squads of mounted police kept the demonstrators from dispersing with speeches and pamphlets but there were no arrests.
