### Teachers Decide On Definite Action

The country teachers in the main belong to this class.

"If the province is not willing to pay its teachers the very reasonable salary of \$400 per annum, then the community doesn't deserve to have any teachers at all," said the Superintendent.

In detail, the requirements of the union place the minimum supplements as follows: 1st class teachers in rural districts, \$175; 1st class teachers in village schools, \$200; 2nd class teachers in rural schools, \$150; 2nd class teachers in village schools, \$175; 3rd class teachers in rural schools, \$100; 3rd class teachers in village schools, \$125. With the statutory allowance of \$180 paid to a 2nd class lady teacher, the additional allowance up to one-quarter of this last amount and the one dollar per scholar based on the average attendance in each half-year, the total income would reach the amount stated, \$400.00.

"The Charlottetown teachers don't want to strike," said Mr. Campbell, "and will do their best to avoid it; but they feel in honor bound to support the rural teachers as members of the same union. And if necessary the community will have to be shocked into a realization of the seriousness of the situation."

"The demands of the teachers are generally recognized as fair and what is needed is the influence of the prominent men of the province in their behalf. The pressure of public opinion must be brought to bear on the situation," Mr. Campbell pointed out that in the aggregate there was an increase of \$14,000 in district supplements last year, but distributed as it is among five hundred teachers, it was really negligible. Otherwise there had been no increase in teachers' salaries since the beginning of the war to offset the higher cost of living.

"The situation is serious from the point of view of school efficiency, as well," said Mr. Campbell. Under the present conditions a teacher may manage for a year but at the end finds it intolerable, and as a result obtains a post elsewhere. As soon as they find themselves experienced and capable of managing a school they leave for places where living conditions are better. Consequently the whole educational system suffers and we carry on the schools with a succession of teachers."

#### School Attendance.

Speaking of the attendance at schools, Mr. Campbell stated that the enforcement of the absentee law being in the hands of district trustees, it was never invoked and might just as well be off the statute books. No effort was made to compel children to attend school or was legal action ever taken against the parents.

"In the towns and villages the average daily attendance is 63 per cent, while in the rural districts it is as low as 50 per cent," said the Superintendent. "The power of compulsion should be invested in a central authority."

#### Dr. Robertson.

"I am heartily in support of the demands of the teachers," said Dr. S. N. Robertson, Principal of the Prince of Wales College, to the Guardian, "and I believe the action they are taking is necessary to achieve their ends and the advancement of the cause of education."

### Lloyd Harris Leaves for Canada

(Special to The Guardian) LONDON, Sept. 30.—Lloyd Harris is sailing for Canada on October 20 to discuss with the Government the future of the trade mission and other questions calling urgently for settlement. Mr. Harris is desirous of returning to private life, according to friends. Unless he is assured of greater cooperation and assistance in the work of development of Canada's trade by the home Government, Canadian business men in London urge more emphatically than ever the need of entire organization of all overseas representatives offices with the object co-ordination of efforts.

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


