THE CANADIAN EXPRESS COMPANY'S CONTRACT.

We referred the other day to the early expiry of the contract with the Anglo American Telegraph Company for our improved telegraph service, and the necessity of immediate attention being given thereto in order to secure its renewal on more equitable and satisfactory terms. A matter of almost equal public concern is the fact that the contract between the Railway Department and the Canadian Express Company, under which the company enjoys the exclusive right to carry on express business on the P. E. Island Railway, will expire in December next. This matter is the more urgent from the fact that the existing contract and the conditions to which it has given rise are not satisfactory.

The effects of this monopoly in express business have been from time to time ventilated in the press, at Board of Trade meetings and before the visiting deputy ministers. It has been clearly shown that the monopoly has led to just such exactions, troubles and complaints as have been, and are and will always be the result of exclusive privileges. A company once given exclusive control of a given section of country, quite naturally farms it for all it is worth. In this case the monopoly has been profitable and the company may be expected to make every effort to have

PROMOTING IMPERIAL INTERESTS.

SYDNEY, Sept. 20.—The Chamber of Commerce before adjourning on Saturday night, passed a resolution urging the creation of an Imperial Advisory Council for the purpose of promoting Imperial interests and removing commercial restrictions. Another resolution strongly advocated state owned cables, better postal arrangements, and cheaper cable tolls.
