Romance is Dead Says English Mother

Recently I was talking to a clever and attractive woman who is the mother of five—three girls and two boys—of ages ranging from 18 upward, and discussed the present generation of modern youth.

"I am not one of those mothers who think the young generation of today either shocking or degenerate, she said. "I have had plenty of opportunity of studying them very closely. I don't consider them fast or bad-mannered. I think many people and writers in particular, are too asty by a few latent examples who are by no means typical of modern youth."

"The young men and girls of today are splendid. To me they seem brighter and clever than the young folk of my day. They have more go and enterprise about them. Of course they are slangy, and they treat and talk of their parents and elders in a way that would not be tolerated in my youth. But they are quite, all right. The chief difference that I notice about them is a lack of what I call romance. They, of course, call it sentimentality.

"I will explain what I mean. Take my children. They are all perfect. But they have none of them a single scrap of romance or the romantic spirit in them. I don't mean to say they don't have love affairs. But in the way they regard them and the manner in which they talk about them there is no romance.

"Regard Love as a Sideline "To me love is and always has been the greatest and most wonderful thing in life. It is something sacred and mysterious, the only bulwark against the blows and sorrows of existence, the only refuge in time of trouble, grief and disappointment. To most of the young people of today I have met it is—what shall I say?—a sort of sideline, to be sandwiched in between other pleasures.

"The trouble is that the young men and girls of today are simply pleasure-mad. They are all bent on having what they call a good time. And this constant rush for pleasure and excitement develops a certain hardness and selfishness of disposition which is destructive of the finer instincts of love.

"So far as marriage goes they are extraordinarily cool and calculating. None of my children are married. The boys, I feel sure, are waiting until they can start as rich as their father left off, and the girls too, sweet as they are, have decided opinions of their own as to what they call suitable marriages. To me it seems they are likely to miss the most beautiful and desirable things in life. It is almost as though romance—what I call romance—were dead.

"Life cannot be all laughter. But my young people never cry, or if they do they never let me or the others see their tears. They are ashamed of tears. Yet tears as much as laughter make up life's romance."

ILL-FEELING AROUSED

BERLIN, March 2.—The Japanese Government, which during the war confiscated 1000 German patents, has decided to return 500 of them to the Germans and sell the other 500 to Japanese concerns according to a communication from "important industrial circles" published here. Complaint is made that the Japanese attitude is without precedent, and is arousing ill-feeling, and hampering the re-establishment of desirable commercial relations.

Looking for a more desirable occupation he hit upon lighthouse-keeping as the perfect job for a man who wanted solitude. And if

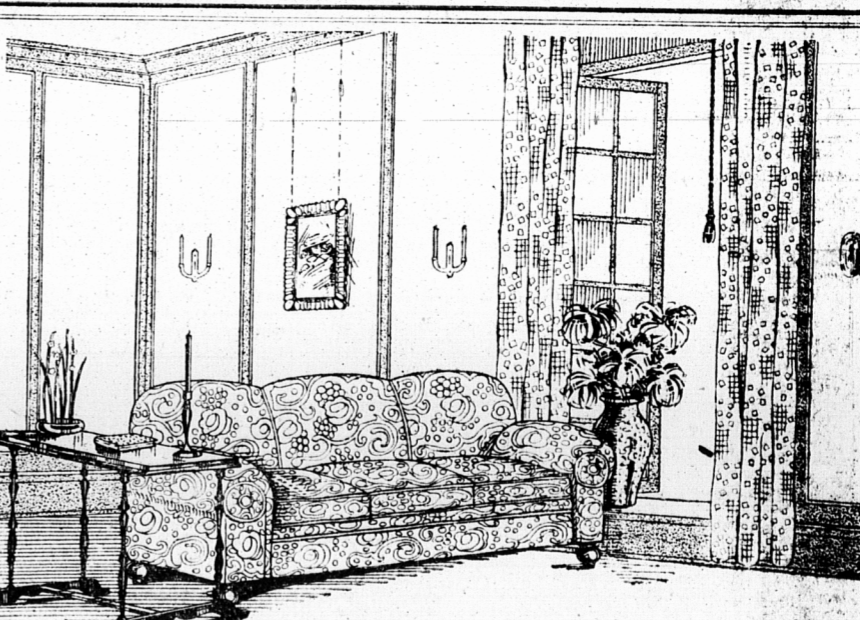
