Last evening Prof. Barlow spoke before The Teachers' Federation on A. Tour through England. It will be remembered that Prof. Barlow purposes if sufficient number are forthcoming to take an excursion party to England during the coming holiday season.

The present month of March has up to this date not been marked by the usual wide variations of temperature peculiar to the month. Apparently the variations of weather occurred last month. This month in fact has furnished remarkably even weather, the thermometer registering not much on either side of the freezing mark, except a few nights ago when it dropped nearly to zero. Yesterday at 9 a. m. it registered 26 above zero; the highest during the day was 30 above and at nine last night it was 18 above.

Last night marked an occasion in the musical life of Charlottetown that will dwell for some time in the memory of those who were so fortunate as to be present at the sacred concert then given in St. Dunstan's Cathedral. The composition of the program was most commendable, in that it furnished forth numbers of approved merit and full of the qualities that convey pleasure to the musically inclined. St. Dunstan's Choir had four numbers—choruses, with a solo part by Mrs. Byrnes in one of them. The choir is deserving of the highest praise for the manner in which they rendered all their numbers, doing credit to their instructor and to the splendid music they were interpreting. Among the soloists of the evening were such well-known local favorites as Mrs. Byrnes, Miss Amy Barle, Miss Lucy Blanchard, Miss Edna Sinclair, Rev. F. X. Gallant, and Dr. Caven. All these acquitted themselves with their usual ability and grace. Among the vocalists not so familiar to the audience were Miss Constance Fitzgerald, who solo, "O Salutaris" was magnificently sung; Mr. Wallace, whose baritone voice was most agreeably heard in Luzzi's Ave Maria; and Mrs. Fraser whose solo was notably well rendered. A vocal duet by Miss Lucy Blanchard, and W. J. Brown, and an instrumental trio by Messrs. Trainor, Cantwell and Brown were features deserving of praise; and the organ solo by Prof. Earle, the first number of the program, was played with such mastery ability that the memory of it lingered all through the evening in the minds of his hearers.
