Members And Guests Crowd New Rink For Opening Ceremony Held Last Night

The City's new curling rink, the property of the Charlottetown Curling Club, Limited, was officially opened by His Worship Mayor E. A. Foster last night.

Mr. W. W. Lord, president of the organization presided at the ceremony, which took place on the ice where His Worship curled the first stone.

Almost the entire membership of the club, now numbered at close to 150, witnessed the ceremony.

Mayor Foster assured the Club of his pleasure at being present to curl the first stone and conveyed greetings on behalf of citizens generally.

In the new property, he was told by a reliable authority, the club had something as good or better than any other similar club east of Toronto.

His Worship predicted in the very near future a team from the local Club would return with the Macdonald Brier Trophy.

Mr. Lord, president, in a brief opening address sketched the efforts of Charlottetown curlers to keep their sport alive since the first curling rink in the Province was erected here 25 years ago.

Winter set in before the present property was completed, he explained, but construction work would be carried on later.
