AUTONOMOUS NORTH CHINA STATE AIM

Japan Seeks To Smash Power of Marshal Chiang Kai-Shek To Gain Alignment.

(C. P. Havas) (By Guardian's Special Wire) TOKYO, Nov. 1.—Japan's new policy in China is to smash the power of Marshal Chiang Kai-Shek, create an autonomous state in the north and support anti-Chiang and anti-Nanking elements in the south, it was understood today from high official sources.

The Japanese army looks with disfavor on the growth of Chiang's power. He drove Communist armies from Central China and brought under united rule 10 of China's 18 provinces.

At the conference of military and diplomatic officials in Tokyo a month ago, military leaders told the Foreign Office its policy of cooperation with Chiang was hopeless.

Chiang, they said, regarded himself as powerful enough to resist Japanese pressure. It was also feared he would consolidate his grip at the present meeting of Kuomintang leaders in Nanking.

Soviet-China Link

From this the Japanese saw a possible rapprochement with the Soviet Union directed against Japan. The Japanese it was indicated, desire to find a Chinese leader capable of assuming responsibility for an independent northern government with Japanese support. Such a government would be able to seize customs revenue collected at Tientsin. This would support the regime without requiring a financial effort on Japan's part, it is held.

Japan does not fear that such a move would lead to complications with powers signatory to the Boxer protocol of 1901 since the rise of an "independent" government in North China would be an "internal" matter.

Likely Candidates

Among possible candidates for head of the proposed regime are General Shang Chen, governor of Hopei, and Gen. Yen Hsi-Shan, governor of Shansi. These generals hesitate to compromise themselves too deeply with the Japanese because they fear Chiang Kai-Shek's reprisals.

The Japanese military conference at Dairen on Oct. 14, decided in these circumstances to precipitate events before the opening of the Kuomintang meeting.

This was to begin by trying to force Chiang into an alliance with the Japanese. Thus the autonomist agitation in the north, the Svalow incident in the south and the present mission of General Yasuji Okamura, commander of the second section of the general staff at Tientsin, to Canton with offers of military and economic support to the local militarists there, have all been interpreted as the beginning of Japan's attempt to encircle the Nanking government.

NANKING, China, Nov. 1.—The critical wounding of Premier Wang Ching-wei by an assassin today was blamed by police upon a "well organized plot by Chinese Communists."

Eleven suspects are held in the assassination attempt, including a girl Communist. The would-be killer himself is gravely wounded. Wang Ching-wei, 50, popularly regarded as pro-Japanese, and another official of the Nationalist government, were shot down just before a meeting of Chinese leaders to consider Japanese demands concerning North China.

The assassin, Sun Ming-Hsun, was critically wounded. Police were unable to say definitely whether he shot himself or was wounded by the Premier's bodyguard, which returned the fire.

Wounded three times, Wang Ching-wei was in a serious condition in hospital tonight.

Police identified the assassin as a reporter for a Chinese news agency. They said he used a camera to shield his pistol.

ed excellent technical control of the keyboard and the fluency, charm and variety of tone in her playing gives promise of a very successful musical career.

Clementi Sonatina No. 6. Velocity study no 11—Czerny. "La Cavalier Fantastique"—Benjamin Godard.

Mr. Morris then sat at the piano and for an hour played steadily one composition after another with hardly a pause to allow for the enthusiastic applause of the audience. He played first Beethoven's well known Sonata Opus 27 no 2 known as "The Moonlight Sonata" bringing out all the beauty and sadness of the adagio, the delicacy of the scherzo and the grandeur of the presto movement.

Following this he played a group of Etudes, Preludes and the intricate waltz of Chopin, "The Spinning Song" by Mendelssohn, Liszt's "Gnomonreigen" and a group of his own compositions including an arrangement of "Old Black Joe."

All the numbers were played with the brilliance for which Mr. Morris is famed. Before the close of his program Mr. Morris gave an informal talk on "Why pupils get a certain distance and no further in their music study"—When pupils give up lessons the driving force, that is the teacher is absent and only the very ambitious pupils go ahead.

Mr. Morris strongly advises the study of Piaty followed by Czerny "School of Velocity," "Forty Daily Studies" and Opus 740 which contains some very stirring studies, one of which he played as illustration. Finally the School of Virtuosity gives technical problems which when mastered equip the student for the most difficult compositions of the great masters.

At the request of the host, Mr. Morris then gave a stirring interpretation of "Le Marsais" followed by the National Anthem. Delicious refreshments were served and the guests spent a very pleasant hour in interesting and leisurely discussion of an unforgettable evening's entertainment.

Greece To Vote For Or Against Monarchy Sunday

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) ATHENS, Nov. 1.—The government tonight took steps to maintain order in Sunday's plebiscite on re-election of the monarchy.

It made public a "law of necessity," specifying stiff penalties for all "persons who in any way disturb order or security or the country's peace, or directly or indirectly incite the populace to rebellion." Violators will be sentenced to deportation.

Meanwhile, frequent but unconfirmed reports circulated that former King George II had asked former Premier Venizelos, an opponent of the monarchy, to aid him in reaching a medium between Liberalism and Fascism. King George is expected to return after the plebiscite.

will be less in 1935 than in 1934. Operations in the iron and steel industry have expanded appreciably during the past year; orders on hand assure steady employment for some time to come. Although coal output in Cape Breton was somewhat smaller in the first eight months of 1935 than in the corresponding period of the preceding year, employment has been well maintained.

Maritime Provinces

For twelve months past there has been no significant change in the state of business in the Maritime Provinces. The volume of retail and wholesale trade was little larger during the third quarter of this year than during the corresponding period of 1934. Employment, it is true, has expanded but the upturn has been largely due to the temporary stimulus of increased highway construction. The outlook for agriculture has improved considerably, but conditions in the lumber and fishing industries have shown evidence of recession.

Farmers harvested better than average crops and orchards yielded a large quantity of high-grade apples. Since the apple crop in England was much below average, market prospects for the Nova Scotia product are promising. The yield of potatoes will be considerably smaller than that of last year, but prices are substantially higher.
