## MR. FIELDING RE-ELECTED.

As announced yesterday morning the election in Queen's Shelburne resulted in the re-election of the Finance Minister by a large and largely increased majority. There seems good reason to believe that this verdict expresses the honest verdict of the electors. It was given out in advance that neither the Opposition candidate nor the party with which he was acting would spend any money or use any corrupt influence in the contest, but would run a clean election, and should there be any evidence of unlawful methods on the other side would promptly put the matter into the election court again. A reward of \$1,000 was offered by the Halifax Herald for evidence that would convict any one of corrupt practices in this election. Mr. Fielding on his part publicly warned his supporters to keep the law, and that any illegal act would be a great wrong to the country and to him. He would not want to be unseated again, and his election was sure enough, any way. We therefore incline to think that the contest has been conducted with comparative purity.

Mr. Fielding's exceptionally large majority bespeaks his personal popularity, the public sense of his ability and usefulness and the sympathy of many who thought it unwise or unfair to unseat him, or to oppose his re-election. The constituency has a good Liberal majority at almost any time, and all Nova Scotia is that way now. We have no fault to find with the verdict, and we regard Mr. Fielding as one of the most capable and useful men in the Liberal party. But we have little sympathy with the notion that he ought not to have been unseated or afterwards opposed. Our firm conviction is that not one in ten are unseated of those who ought to be thus dealt with, and that if our elections are ever to be purified, there must be a frequent and determined resort to the election courts. And it would be absurd to unseat a member-elect and afterward permit him to be re-elected without opposition. Dr. Weldon and his supporters are, we think, to be commended for contesting the seat on the basis of conducting a pure election and insisting that the Liberal party should also conduct their campaign in strict conformity to the law.

There are those who talk much of the undesirability of unseating a member who has a good majority, no matter how it is obtained, or of opposing a candidate who is tolerably certain to be elected. These persons often profess strong opposition to involving the country in the cost of an election. On the other side it may be observed that if the country cannot afford to pay the cost of elections, the sooner we give up our representative system and go back to arbitrary rule the better. The country has much less to fear from the spirit which would contest every election than from the apathy that would let matters take their course. It has infinitely less to fear from the petitioners who put members elect into the election courts than from those who prevent wholesome inquiry by legal tricks and corrupt "saw-offs." Mr. Fielding was unseated for much less offending than took place in London or Brockville, or a dozen other places. He was opposed at the by-election when his return was almost sure. We believe the effect will be wholesome, and will tend to purer elections hereafter. No member of Parliament, much less a member of the Government, should be permitted to hold a seat that is tainted with illegality.

Mr. Murray, the defeated Liberal candidate in North Westford has given out a statement of his belief that within the past ten years \$200,000 has been expended by candidates for the Commons in that constituency to corrupt the electorate.

Hon. Mr. Hyman was the nearest resident Minister to North Bruce in the recent by-election. He took no part in the contest. The obvious reason for his absence was the revelations now being made of the means by which he was himself elected in London. His resignation is called for, not only by the Opposition press but by every independent newspaper in Ontario. Will he resign? Will Sir Wilfrid Laurier permit him to retain his portfolio in view of the revelations made? We shall see.

The best friends of the Liberal party are not doing much about these days. They are doing some hard thinking with a view to prevent it from sharing the fate into which notorious and long continued corruption led the Ross Government in Ontario.

The customs revenue for October was again a record-breaker—\$4,656,022 against \$3,985,158 for October of last year. This is gratifying so far. There is just a possibility of over-liquidation, and still greater danger that "the time of our wealth" may extend the prevalent public extravagance.

Emperor William's answer to the rumored alliance between Britain, France and Italy is to make the Duke of Connaught a Field Marshal in the Prussian army. The act does him credit, and may prove a good diplomatic stroke as well. Britain and Germany ought to be friends, and would be if King Edward could have his peaceful way.

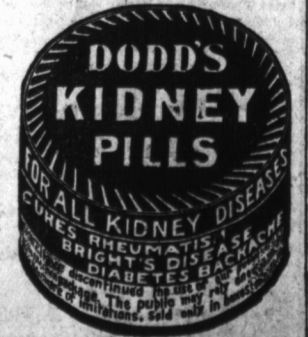

## EDITOR'S MAIL.

**MR. WATSON AND RAGWORT FUNGIDS.**

Sir:—There is no necessity of any undue alarm over my articles on the question of fungus diseases to animal health. Neither is Mr. Watson in danger of being entirely overlooked. The article in the Agriculturalist to which you refer is but the reproduction of one of a series of articles written by me at the special request of the Farmer's Advocate, and it was published as early as August 27th, if I mistake not. There were other articles of a prior date on the Government experiments at Cloverdale. I am discussing the work done there generally, and whilst agreeing with the conclusions arrived at, venture the opinion that although the ragwort is undoubtedly to blame in the Pic on Cattle Disease, it may be only blame-worthy as a host plant for fungus growth which are noxious to animals when ingested into the stomach. This phase of the question has been mooted for years. Mr. Watson says he wrote of it five years ago, but it had not so far impressed the Veterinary-General sufficiently to cause him to consider it in his exhibition. To bring about this I advise in my article a thorough investigation into the plant constituents; and, also, an excursion into the great bacteriologist field, so far neglected. My suggestions have been met in a friendly spirit. Dr. Rutherford is now taking up this interesting study and whilst he holds personally to the opinion that the ragwort itself contains the toxic agent which menaces the lives of the cattle, he is willing to submit the fungus which in some times detected on or about the plant to such examination as may determine the matter one way or the other. Meantime, as there is absolutely nothing definite in the whole fungus theory as it stands today, it will not be necessary to give credit even where credit is due till somebody has determined something creditable in the matter. One thing sure, I want none of Mr. Watson's glory.

## Synopsis of Canadian Northwest HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

ANY EVEN numbered section of Dominion lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 24, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, on the 1st day of October next, or on any day thereafter.

Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated.

Entries must be made personally at the local and office for the district in which the land is situated.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:  
(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.  
(2) If the father for mother, if the father is deceased of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the settlement as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.  
(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon a farm owned or leased by him in the vicinity of the homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the homestead for six months in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands in Ottawa or intention to apply for patent.
