SOUR CREAM FUDGE.

Two and a half cups brown sugar, 1-2 cups sour cream, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla, 1-2 teaspoon salt. Method: Place all ingredients in a saucepan and cook slowly until the sugar is dissolved. Stir almost constantly until a few drops in cold water form a soft ball. Remove from the fire and allow to get perfectly cold. Then beat until creamy. Pour into a buttered pan and mark in squares. Nuts or glace cherries are nice added to this.
