EXHIBITION GROUNDS, Toronto, Sept. 18.—Two records were established at the postponed Canadian National Exhibition athletic meeting here yesterday afternoon. In the thousand yards open handicap Roy Watson, of Chicago, lowered the 2:15 1/5 record of Philip Spink by 1.5 of a second, and in the hundred yards for girls under eighteen years of age Rosa Grosse, Toronto established a new record of 11.25.

Godfrey helped train Jack Dempsey against Tom Gibbons and Luis Angel Firpo.

Bullfights Giving Way to Football In Old Spain

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18.—The immortal bullfight, which is considered the "National Sport" of Spain, now has a formidable rival in soccer football, according to cable advices received by the Department of Commerce from its consul at Malaga, Spain.

With the virtual passing of the sword and red blanket-exhibitions, American sporting goods manufacturing establishments have an opportunity to create a fair market for their goods, the consul also revealed.

Soccer football, which is played throughout northern Spain, was first introduced to Malaga in 1921, when troops on route to Spanish Morocco, including a crack soccer team, challenged the city to a series of games for the benefit of wounded soldiers.

"With a desire to aid in raising funds for the soldiers and acquire knowledge of the game," the report stated, "a team was organized, the challenge accepted and soccer had come to stay."
