Cod Fisheries Newfoundland's Basic Industry

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., March 1—Joe Moore, 26, bronzed and tough, is a cod fisherman. As such, he is a working part of Newfoundland's basic industry.

Joe's shanty lies at the foot of Signal Hill, the towering rock that looms over this ancient port and the Narrows through which ships pass to and from the sea.

At night, from the door of his shanty, one can see the little fishing boats bobbing in the swell below, the flashing light on Chain Rock near the Narrows, the big revolving beam on the far side, the riding beacons of freighters docked in the harbor and the thousand twinkling lights of the city itself.

One can smell the salt drying on the flakes—or stagings—around Joe's shanty and the scores of other shanties that twine around the foot of the hill. Always, there is the lap of the sea at the piling.

Joe is owner and skipper of his own boat and has a crew of five. Some of them have their tiny homes behind the stagings but those who are not married spend most of their time, when not fishing, in the shanty.

The shanty is on the second storey, so to speak. Below it is the heavily-planked wharf where the cod is salted down and stacked to dry. Under that again is the water. The fish are thrown out of the boats at the end of the wharf and cleaned and hosed down on rough wooden tables.

Home And Workshop The shanty consists of three rooms, one of them open to the weather. Fish are stacked in one, gear is kept in another and the crew makes its home in a third.

In this last room are two double bunks, a small table and bench and a stove and cupboard. The men do their own cooking and are partial to bacon and eggs.

When working the cod traps Joe and his men roll out about 5 a.m. for their first trip of the day. The boat is about 25 feet long and carries an eight horsepower engine.

In the summer Joe and his crew trap fish. The traps are square and buoyed at the four corners. A "leader" is used to guide the cod into the net.

Hauling the nets in dumping their contents and getting them out again is back-breaking work. Joe's nets are about four miles outside the harbor near Blackhead. A trip may take three or four hours and the second is made about midnight. After that comes the cleaning and salting. One day's work may be as short as 10 hours. Usually, however, a working day runs to 16 or 18 hours.

Joe Moore began to fish when he was 11 after his father was drowned. Before the war he could make only \$300 a year (in 1936, 25 per cent of the working population made less than \$100 a year) but he's doing about five times better than that now.

Dried cod brings Newfoundland about \$17,000,000 a year and fresh and frozen cod more than \$6,000,000. This represents about one quarter of Newfoundland's total exports.

The cod industry can be classified into three groups—inshore, deep-sea and the Labrador. Most fishermen in Newfoundland—there are about 30,000—work inshore. They use trawl lines early in the season and switch to cod traps later on. One of Joe Moore's cod nets may bring up 60,000 pounds in a single haul so that fish slip over the sides of the boat. The traps usually are set on shoals near headlands and the take is big when the cod is "running."

Deep-sea fishing is done almost exclusively from the south coast by schooners up to 150 tons. They fish the banks, great shoals lying far off the southeast coast. In winter schooners sometimes ice up so badly that they turn turtle.

Two groups operate in Labrador waters—"stationers" who have their fishing "rooms" based on shore and schooners that carry their crews and gear with them from Newfoundland. They move about with the runs and split and salt their cod on board.

Sizzling Dispute Between Browns And Cardinals

(By The Associated Press) ST. LOUIS, March 3—A sizzling dispute between the St. Louis Browns and the Cardinals burned hot and strong today. The Browns announced they are going to court with an eviction suit April 1—"and it won't be April Fool."

It will be a suit to throw the Cardinals out of Sportsman's Park, which the Browns own, and which the American and National League clubs have shared for 28 years.

The "no fooling" remark came from Bill Dewitt, president of the Browns, who wants to raise the rent from \$35,000 a year.
