CZECHOSLOVAK FOREIGN TRADE IN 1929

The Czechoslovak foreign trade turnover in 1929 was 40,300 millions of crowns against 40,400 millions of crowns in 1928. The imports last year amounted to 19,900 million of crowns in 1928 to 19,200 millions and exports to 20,400 millions of crowns in 1928 to 21,200 millions, according to these figures the foreign trade in 1929 shows a favorable balance of half million as against 2 millions of crowns in 1928. The exports of manufactured goods are gradually growing while exports of raw material, of provisions, and of drinks are declining. As to the imports, they show an increase in raw materials, manufactured goods and living animals, and decrease in provisions and drinks.

Dominion Bridge

People closely identified with the building trade predict that the outlook for 1930 is better now than it was a short time ago and there are some indications that the volume of new construction will be even greater than in 1929, notwithstanding the fact that the construction industry reached a new peak in 1929.

The continued strength in the shares of Dominion Bridge would appear to confirm such a forecast. The radical change in the credit situation is, perhaps, the basis for the rather optimistic estimate for the current year, together with the generally recognized fact that inability to obtain mortgage money last year had been the real influence in retarding construction activities. At the same time it is well known on the Street that the Dominion Bridge insiders are very bullish on their stock and as a high official of the company pointed out the other day by the remark that they have written off large amounts for depreciation on plants and property and some day the people who are buying the share today will reap a good harvest.

C. P. R.

It is interesting to note that over 60% of the outstanding common shares of the Canadian Pacific Railway are held in Great Britain and Canada. The general opinion has become current that the United States is the largest holder of C. P. R. which is incorrect.

Famous Players

The strength in Famous Players last week is now explained. Mr. Cohen the managing director in an official statement has stated that the Canadian Company may consider a merger with the Gaumont interest of Great Britain. It will be remembered that the reason for the resignation of Mr. Nathanson, the former general manager, was due directly to the fact that the management would not consider an offer of \$75 a share for Famous Players stock from the Gaumont people. Consequently, should a merger go through, the shareholders of Famous Players would receive at least \$75 for their stock and possibly more. On the basis of current earnings, this figure would appear to be excessive.

It would not be surprising if the "paper" stocks were taken in hand in the not distant future and moved up. All the unfavorable news is now known and in practically all cases has been discounted. The securities are believed to be in a sold-out condition and any favourable development would, no doubt, result in a quick rebound. A merger of St. Lawrence Paper, Brompton and St. John Power & Paper is believed to be in the final stages and announcement of its consummation may again focus the attention of the "Street" on this class of security.
