The book itself had helped to right a great wrong, it commanded universal attention and all but universal sympathy; at the same time it left such a healthful, hopeful lesson. At St. Paul's School last night there assembled a large audience expectant of an enjoyable rendering of the promising program. The highest expectations were realized. It was evident that all conditions favored a successful evening.

The excellence of the hall for such an affair was manifest at the start when the brass quartet by the Macfarlane brothers and Messrs Division and Cook surprised many by its sweetly charming effect. That there is here a talented quartette of instrumentalists, dawned pleasantly on the audience who by their applause testified to their delight. A solo and chorus followed,—the solo by Mrs. Bentley who with all her old ability and winsome singing, brought her hearers into key with her. She was splendidly upheld by the effective chorus of twenty-five voices. Master Jack Gordon was forced to respond to an encore when he made A Hundred pipers follow Soldiers and Sailors of the King. Mr. Howatt, in the Death of Nelson gave an enjoyable rendition of a grand and popular song. The duets by Mrs. John Trainor and Miss Lawson; by Miss Macdonald; and the vocal quartette by Mesdames Mitchell, Bentley, Chandler and Down, were by recognized local singers who acquitted themselves with the usual happy result. The piano quartette and toe duo for piano and organ was indebted for successful and skillful rendering to Mrs. F. Mitchell, Misses Hyndman and Harrison and Prof. Earle. Worthy of special mention and emphatic approval was a grand item, No. 11 on the program—a piano quartette with orchestra—which has left with all hearers a lingering desire for more and a hope for its early gratification, and a similar sentence might truthfully be pronounced upon the male quartette The Leader of the German Band. Altogether a delightfully agreeable evening in most agreeable quarters, where everything was sympathetically at concert pitch and the harmony was not disturbed by a jarring note, figuratively or literally.
