IN MEMORIAM

MRS. SUSANNA MURRAY

"Dearest mother you have left us, For your home beyond the sky." Oft do the children of the late Mrs. Susanna Murray repeat these words, as it more clearly dawns upon them that they have lost the one friend whose place can never be filled, when on the evening of Thursday sixth inst. her spirit was transported to life eternal at the great age of 92 years.

The late Mrs. Murray, more fondly known as "grandma" was born in Vernon River on Jan. 4th, 1841, and remained with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Tobias Coady until her twenty-first year when she left the romantic scenery of Vernon River for the "up hill and down dale beauty" of Lot 65 as the bride of the late John Murray a prosperous young farmer.

This blissful union was blessed with 10 children, all of whom survive, and in their respective places, honor the memory of their late parents.

The deceased lady was widely known, loved and admired for those sterling qualities that distinguish the mother, friend and citizen, and tangible sympathy was bestowed upon those in affliction. She enjoyed to the fullest God's beautiful creation, her long life glided smoothly onward and in life's horizon the sun shone brightly.

Her last years were spent in Charlottetown with her daughter, Mrs. James Hickey, 208 Dorchester St., and it can be said to her credit and that of her other daughters, that nothing was wanting in filial love, affection and solicitude, for an aged parent, the greater her suffering the more she was impressed with the agony of her crucified Redeemer.

Spiritual consolations were derived from the frequent visits of Rev. Louis Dougan, and when the final moment came, with the Sacred names upon her lips, she calmly and peacefully answered the summons.

The remains were taken to her late home, Lot 65, and viewed by a concourse of people who were oftentimes benefited by her wise counsel.

The funeral was held Saturday morning, The Mass of Requiem was celebrated by a former pastor, Rev. Father Curran, whilst the pastor, Rev. Father Herrell from the choir, sent forth the plaintive melody, making the solemn service even more impressive.

Following the final absolution the remains were placed in the family plot, side by side with loved ones gone before.

Presentation Made To Rev. Earl Dalton At Service In Tignish Church.

The Church of St. Simon and St. Jude, Tignish, was the scene of a happy event Sunday when Rev. Earl Dalton, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Dalton of Sea Cow Pond, and grand nephew of Lieutenant Governor Dalton, who was ordained at St. Dunstan's Basilica on April 23rd, celebrated his first Solemn High Mass, assisted by Rev. J. D. McNeill, and Rev. G. J. McEllan as Deacon, and Sub-deacon, and with the pastor, Rev. J. A. MacDonald seated in the sanctuary.

Rev. Father McEllan in delivering the sermon on the occasion spoke in feeling terms of the events leading up to the ordination of the new priest, and of his great achievement in making so many sacrifices and in surmounting so many difficulties to finally accomplish his desire. He gave a splendid oration on the sacerdotal duties of the clergy, urging other young men to heed the call of the Divine Master by fitting themselves educationally for the labors involved.

He had known Father Dalton for many years while pastor here and was proud to realize that he had succeeded in achieving his great ambition and that such a large congregation of his own people were today showing their respect and offering thanks to Almighty God on the occasion of this glorious event, a young priest's first Solemn High Mass, the beginning of his life work.

At the close of the ceremony the choir sang the "Te Deum" after which an address was read from the French parishioners by Mr. J. J. Arsenault. This was couched in the beautiful French language and in inspiring terms showed the appreciation of the event by the Acadians of Tignish. This was followed by an address in English, read by Mr. C. P. McCarthy, B. A., and which was replete with kind words, sentiments and assurances of affection towards Father Dalton on this occasion. These addresses were accompanied by a presentation from the parishioners consisting of a leather case purse and sick call case.

Father Dalton replied in French and English saying he was greatly surprised and pleased with the addresses. He publicly thanked his parents, relatives, friends the clergy and his teachers at the Institutions where he had received his education for the great assistance they had at all times given him in his struggle for success.

Reverend Earl Dalton: There is much joy in the hearts of the congregation of Tignish parish today as we welcome you back to our midst and kneel in Divine supplication on this the event of your first solemn High
