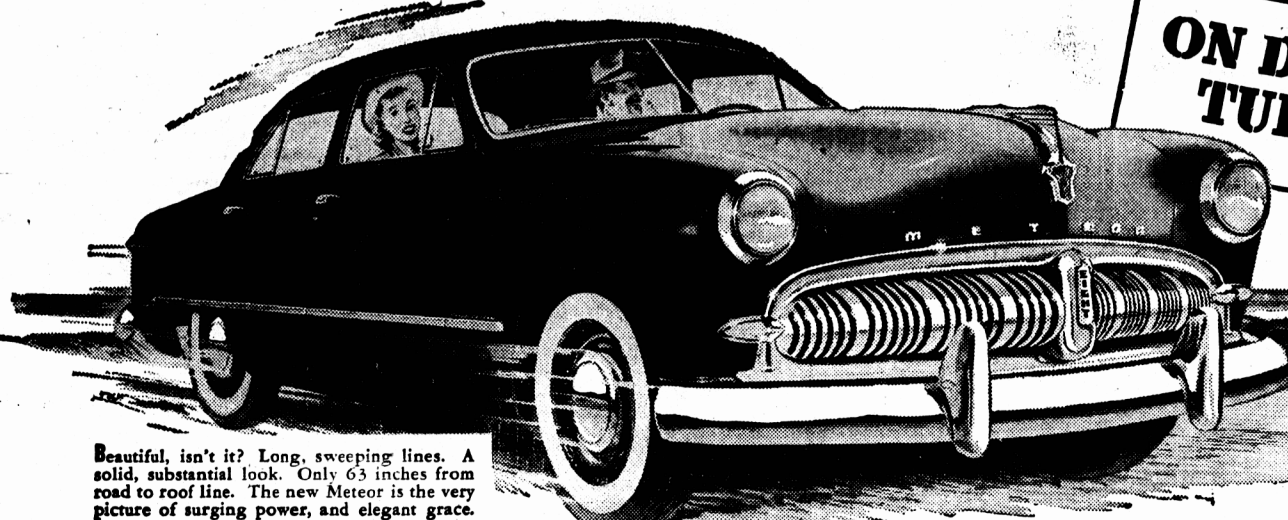
"So is Cicily," said Belle, swerving the shaft of that bright bland smile with the accuracy of a searchlight on the second wife of her first husband.

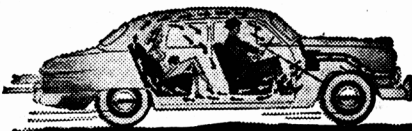
