A TALK WITH THE PRESIDENT.

The subjoined extract from a personal letter written by J. H. Bell, ex-M. P. was not intended for publication, but contains matter of so much interest that we feel assured Mr. Bell will pardon its publication. Under date of Washington, March 25, Mr. Bell writes: 'I have been visiting the Senate and House of Representatives a good deal and have been much impressed with the intelligence, the alertness, the business ability and the debating capacity of the members of both Houses. They are also a social and gentlemanly lot. The people have evidently selected their best men for legislators. The United States Senate ranks higher than ours. They cannot originate money bills but they can amend and add to them, which is tantamount to originating such bills. With them lies the appointment of all civil servants, etc.'

It is a curious feature that they have so many committees that every Republican Senator is chairman of some committee. Being chairman he has the privilege of having a secretary, paid by the government and has a separate room occupied by himself and secretary, and occasionally by the committee. The multiplication of committees is a device to put all the Senators on the same footing, giving each the same honors and emoluments.

In the House of Representatives there are also many committees. The chairman of each has charge of some work—for instance of the appropriations for post offices. That chairman in the Congress takes the place and performs the functions of one of our Ministers on the floor of the House and answers all questions relative to the matter of the proposed appropriation.

When the House is in Committee of the whole both sides consent to a rule of five minutes speeches and one of such debates is about as lively a bit of intellectual skirmishing as I have ever listened to. To catch the eye of the presiding officer a member must be as smart as a steel trap. It is no unusual sight to see a dozen on the floor at once. During the debate one member, sometimes half a dozen, will pry the man who has the floor with questions speaking directly to him and not putting the question through the chair as with us.

Yesterday I called on the President and was introduced by Senator Proctor. The President is small in stature, with a very pleasant, expressive face, lively and free in conversation, keen and inquisitive. When he smiles it is a smile all over the face; when he moves it is with grace and alertness. I was introduced as an ex M. P. from Prince Edward Island, Canada. The President said, 'I am pleased to meet one of the representative men of Canada. I know a little about P. E. Island, about the difficulties of its winter navigation and its delightful summer climate.'

He then pried me with questions about the different nationalities that compose

our population. Were there many Scots there? And did they speak Gaelic? And was the Gaelic taught in the schools? Were the French prosperous and contented? Did they cling to the customs and language of old France? And was the French in the curriculum of the common schools? 'By the way,' he said, 'I must tell you, Mr. Bell, that Senator Proctor is my mentor in the matter of hunting.' I replied that if all the hunting stories reported by the papers are true, the mentor must be proud of his pupil.

Then speaking to Senator Proctor the President said, 'I have it in my mind to recommend the introduction of Japanese wrestling among the students at West Point. I wish such a splendid exercise.' The Senator confessed ignorance of what Japanese wrestling was like. 'Oh, a sport about as wild as football,' suggested the President. 'Let me give you an illustration.' Here he rose from his seat as if to take hold of the Senator, who drew back, saying, 'No, thank you; I will be perfectly satisfied with a verbal explanation.' However the President assured him that he meant not to injure him, then took hold of the Senator's hand, doubled it inward, elevated the elbow and then explained: 'Now when I have you in with this grip in this position you have then only two alternatives before you—either to have your arm broken or to stand on your head.'

The whole interview was most interesting to me. Here was republicanism exemplified—no formality or red tape in the matter of the introduction, no restraint in the conversation, yet in the presence of this almost boyish freedom and exuberance you felt you were in the presence of a true gentleman.—My visit to Washington has been a most delightful one.
