EASTERN NOTES.—The politician is

In your last you referred to the
modern conveniences which other
sections of the Island are enjoying, and
of which we in the east are deprived,
viz:—the telephone, the railway and
the daily mail. In 1891, when the
Government of that day subsidised the
Telephone Co. for extending their
lines to different localities on the Island,
those whose special care was for the
interests of the east were assured, and
were shown documentary evidence in
support of it, that the Dominion Government
were going to extend the line to
East Point lighthouse at an early date
and two more lighthouses a little later.
When they failed to do this, the Local
Administration again agreed to give the
company the usual subsidy, but the
company declined, on the ground that
some of the local lines were not paying.
I believe the present Local Administration
will still subsidise the company, any
time they go ahead with the work. I
may say further that the Dominion Government
has likewise been approached
not long ago, and they declined to carry
out the work at present, as many
lighthouses might be looking for similar
privileges. I might say that if telephone
communication was established with
the lighthouses and a signal station
erected there, it would be quite a
convenience to the shipping interests of
the gulf as a large number of vessels
all sizes and rigs, steam and sail are
continually passing in all directions.—
Steven Rose of Priest Pond and family
