—SHIPPING BECOMING BRISK.—Shipping is expected to be quite brisk at Summerside this fall. On Thursday notice was received that the first big steamer to load potatoes this season at this port is due to arrive at the Marine Wharf on Monday next for a full cargo of table stock for Cuba. Quantities of potatoes are now arriving and are being stored in the extension warehouses on the wharf for shipment. These include two carloads of certified seed which arrived on Thursday as the start of a cargo being got ready for another steamer expected next week. The big four-masted schooner Catherine May, that recently unloaded coal here for Messrs. Holmans Ltd., is at the Marine Wharf and has been chartered to load table stock potatoes for the New York market. The schooner Maude Weston, Capt. Weston, which has, as usual, been bringing lumber all the summer to Summerside, for Messrs. M. F. Schurman & Co., left for Richibucto, N. B., on Wednesday with half a cargo of cement but when about half way there had to return to Summerside on account of bad weather. She left again on Thursday and will return lumber laden.
