TWENTY THOUSAND JAPS BACK TO FENG WANG CHENG

Made Quick Retreat Harassed by Cossacks—Doings Around Port Arthur—A Russian Defeat—British Sympathy—Kussian Cruiser Ashore—Togo Active.

JAPS RETREAT TO FENG WANG CHENG.
NEW CHWANG, May 20.—(Special)—Reports of the Japanese retreat to Feng Wang Cheng are officially confirmed. THEY MADE GOOD TIME.
The Japanese numbering 20,000 came upon 32,000 Russians in a strong position on Monday sixty miles west of Feng Wang Cheng.
It being unwise to risk a battle the Japanese retreated with great rapidity. COSSACKS HARASSED THEIR FLANKS.
An unofficial Russian authority says a pitched battle was fought, but rumor says there was a considerable loss on both sides during clashes with the Cossacks harassing the flanks of the Japanese. IN AND ABOUT PORT ARTHUR.
Heavy firing was heard in the direction of Port Arthur early this morning. Chinese arriving from Dainy say the Russians regained control of the railway but lost it again, and that Port Arthur is well provisioned. JAPS LANDING AT TAKU SHAN.
TOKIO, May 20.—(Special)—A portion of the Japanese army commenced land-

ing at Taku Shan west of the mouth of Yalu River yesterday. TOGO IS STILL ACTIVE.
Rear Admiral Togo entered Chilli Gulf (f) the morning of the 16th and drove the enemy off the range of hills near Tong Shan. A SECOND DAY'S WORK.
On the seventh he entered Fin Chau Bay and bombarded the railroad bridge, the military train and the enemy's buildings, effecting damage. LOSSES WITH THE HATSUSE.
Three commanders, five second lieutenants, five sub-engineers, ten non-commissioned officers, besides a large number of men went down with the battleship Hatsuse. SUNK WITH THE YOSHINO.
The number of officers and men lost in the cruiser Yoshino was also large. INFANTRY FIGHT, RUSSIANS BEATEN.
In a fight between the Japanese infantry and Russian infantry which took place near Span Chusan on Monday, the Russians were defeated. RUSSIA FEELS MORE CALM.
St. PETERSBURG, May 20.—(Special)—

With greater calm than was felt since the beginning of the war, Russia today faces the situation. COURAGE FROM JAP DISASTERS.
The disasters to the Japanese fleet have strengthened the national spirits. All the papers comment on the affair, saying that the Japanese losses jeopardize their mastery of the sea. BRITISH SYMPATHY FOR JAPAN.
LONDON, May 20.—The English news papers express the greatest regret and sympathy at Japan's ill-luck in losing two warships. They consider it purely an accident, due purely to direct mines, not believing that the Russians placed mines at such a distance eleven miles from port. SMARTNESS IN SAVING LIFE.
Admiration is expressed at the smartness of the Japanese in saving so many lives from their vessels. Incidentally they use the disasters to point out a lesson to the British political party which charges that the Government is spending too much money on the navy. RUSSIAN CRUISER ASHORE.
PARIS, May 20.—The correspondent at St. Petersburg of the Echo De Paris says: "The Russian cruiser Bogatyr grounded during a fog on the rock near the entrance to Vladivostok. Her position is critical. The crew were saved."
