THE NOVA SCOTIA ELECTION.

For pretty nearly a quarter of a century the Liberal party in Nova Scotia had control of the provincial Government. A term of continuous power from July 1882 down to the present time has been excelled by the long Liberal term in Ontario previous to the downfall of the Ross Administration. At the last provincial election only two Conservatives were returned, and present appearances indicate that the Murray Government will obtain an extended lease of power.

It affords an interesting study to lay alongside of this the record of the Province in federal affairs during the same period. In 1882, the same year that brought the Liberal party into control of the affairs of the Province, Nova Scotia sent 15 members out of 21 to Ottawa in support of Sir John Macdonald. In the federal election of 1887 it elected to the Commons 13 Conservatives and eight Liberals. In 1891 the division was 16 Conservatives to five Liberals, and in 1896 an even divide of 10 to 10. The latest Dominion election went wholly Liberal, not a single Conservative being returned.

The Nova Scotian electors appear from this record to be shrewd—we had almost said wise—in their generation. They have kept close to the winning side. They have been apparently equally ready to support a Conservative or a Liberal regime at Ottawa. In 1886 alone, when there was about an even chance for Sir Charles Tupper's Government to be sustained or defeated, the Province decided its support evenly between the parties. A well-established Government with a tolerable reputation may in most cases count upon a pretty clean sweep in Nova Scotia at any time.

It is from a survey of this record that we are led to the conclusion that the Murray Government will probably carry another sweeping majority at the polling on the 20th instant. Its record has developed no scandals and the provincial finances have flourished as never before. We are counting upon the tendency of the electorate of Nova Scotia to be on the winning side, and there appears to be a pretty general conviction that the government will be sustained. At the same time under purely party Government a very long lease of power is usually not best either for the party in office nor for the Province.

Manitoba has the Torrens system of land titles. By means of that system the provincial Government guarantees the titles to almost every bit of land in the Province. Any owner of land can secure the Torrens registration by application and the payment of a small fee. The system greatly simplifies all transfers and mortgages, doing away with the necessity of the purchaser making an investigation of title.

The launch of the Cunard liner Lustrania the other day, accompanied by press reports of the dimensions of the ship, show it to be a record-breaking incident in ship building. The new liner is 790 feet long, 88 feet in greatest breadth and has a displacement of 40,000 tons. With a crew of 800 the Lustrania will be equipped to carry 550 first-class, 500 second-class and 1,300 third-class passengers—a total of passengers and crew together numbering 3,150 souls. At present the largest ship afloat is German. The launch just made gives Britain the old-time precedence in that regard.

THE SOUTHERN MAILS.

So long ago as May 22 Mr. Hughes, M. P. was in receipt of a letter from the Deputy Postmaster General stating that the necessary instructions had been given for the carriage of the mails by the Murray Harbor Railway, and that the change would be made as soon as arrangements could be made for conveying the mails from the railway station to the post offices. It is therefore to be hoped that the people along the line will not have much longer to wait for this desirable improvement, coupled with a double train service. This is not less important than the transfer of the mails. The people served by the railway will not rest contented to have their mails lie over for a night and the greater part of the following day in Charlottetown before being forwarded. A morning mail from the city becomes imperative as soon as the change is made.

The other day Minister Brodeur made the statement that he was tired of being held responsible for the accounts of Tory officials in his department, "who are only too glad to get the Government into trouble." This looks like a thinly veiled threat.

Many will regret to learn of the serious illness of Sir Hector Langevin, one of the few remaining fathers of Confederation. Sir Hector in his prime was an able man and a capable administrator, but his public record was regrettably not free from blame. He is now an old man, having first seen the light in Quebec in 1826.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 24, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated.

Entries must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father or mother, if the father is deceased of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
