

MARITIME HORSEMEN FORM ASSOCIATION

FREDERICTON, Sept. 21.—A meeting of the owners of horses and drivers was held Saturday at Fredericton and there was a large attendance. Many letters of regret from those not in the city were received, all expressing the heartiest sympathy with the movement. The purpose of the gathering was to form a Maritime Horsemen's Association, and among the objects proposed are the question of freight rates, the exclusion of American horses from the provincial races, the bringing before the managers of the several tracks that all dates for circuits be fixed, so as not to clash, and the establishment of a regular Maritime circuit. A committee composed of R. H. Edwards and James Adams of Halifax, Dr. Strickland and F. J. Cameron of P. E. Island, and A. B. Kitchen and J. D. Black of Fredericton were appointed to make arrangements for holding another meeting at Halifax during exhibition week, and in the meantime draft a constitution to be submitted to the meeting. It is proposed to

have a regular paid official to take the business in hand and devote part of his time to the work. J. D. Black was elected secretary pro tem. Among those who attended the meeting was Dr. J. P. Jenkins, aged eighty-one, the veteran horseman of P. E. Island. He took a most enthusiastic interest in the proceedings.

POINTED SUGGESTIONS.

The lessons for the closing quarter of the year promises to be of intense interest. The story of Paul has no dull pages. Every chapter in its

holds us by the fascination of the exciting and heroic and tragic; and the more so, because his character is saturated with the noble and Christian. Not only does one ask at each turn of the thrilling narrative, "What next?" but also, "Has Jesus Christ such followers today as the apostles?" And the Holy Spirit answers, "Yes. He is not left without witnesses," and then probes the heart with the searching question, "Are you one of them?"

Whatever form of trouble Paul expected to meet at Jerusalem as he went thither "bound in the Spirit," and whatever had been the fears of his friends because of which they had warned him most urgently against his purpose, it is not to be supposed that the facts exactly answered them. The devil's ambush lay behind the precautions taken to avoid trouble. He is dastardly strategist. But God turns his wrath into folly. See how soon Paul is preaching the Gospel in a public place, which otherwise would have been absolutely inaccessible.

What do you think of the manner of Paul's reception by the disciples at Jerusalem? They smile all right, and that is good. And they listen to the recital of the marvellous work of grace among the Gentiles and thank God for it, and that is well. But there is no vote of thanks for the collection which the apostle had assiduously and laboriously gathered and brought—there is no mention of it at all. Is not that too? Paul's name should not have been left out of the financial report in that way. People in more recent times have been known to quit when they found their fifty cents was not recorded. But Paul was too big to be a quitter.

No. On the other hand he submits himself to the process, which is suggested to him by which it is thought he can best keep out the harm's way. Their "gooseflesh" got ahead of their gratitude, and Paul must have felt so foolish as David in Saul's armor when he found himself fixed the way they wanted. But bigness condescends to littleness and fearfulness. It can afford it.

But, taking about littleness, what a small hole hatred and fanaticism can crawl through! Like insects that burrow can make their own hole.

The hole is a lie. And so it came to pass that the spectacular occurrence in the temple area, which would make the moving-picture man green with envy to reproduce, had its beginning in malice afore-thought, a devil's tool in the hands of unbridled fanaticism.

The world takes notice of the company you keep, and when its purpose may be served by it against you, it will tell the place and the time that you were with this and so, and that you did such and such. If what is seen is worthy, so let it be, whatever cost. But, if "A word to the wise," etc.

What passed through the mind of Paul while howled at and threatened and justified by the mob? Did he think of the doctrine of retribution? Not likely. In the light of his own experience, and in the strength and joy of his faith he thought, doubtless, of the utter futility of persecution and of the glory of a Gospel that can convert the persecutor. Hence his eagerness to speak to the people. Hence his demand for the protection due to his citizenship. Onward.
