INDIA CHANGES TO GOLD STANDARD

LONDON, Feb. 9.—The Empire of India yesterday changed from a sterling and silver basis to a gold basis.

The main feature is that gold in the future will be the standard value in India and silver will remain a legal tender with the fixed ratio of one rupee for 11,300.16 grains of fine gold.

The reorganization of the Indian currency system assumes great importance because of the huge volume to which foreign trade has grown and the consequent inconvenience in making payments in and taking payments from the outside world when silver, which is so hard to obtain, was the only medium that could be tendered in payment.

From this outline it will be seen that India's new system resembles that in vogue in the United States, because part of the currency is backed by Government bonds and metal while the balance is based on commercial paper and is regulated in quantity by the needs of commerce.

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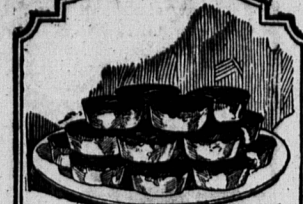

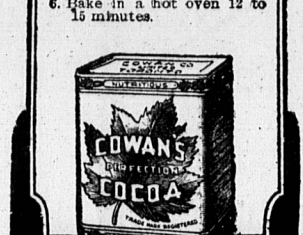


COOKERY COLUMN

COCOA BISCUIT

- 2 cups flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons flour
4 tablespoons Cowan Cocoa
2 tablespoons butter
2/3 cup milk

- 1. Mix and sift dry ingredients.
2. Rub in the butter with the tips of the fingers.
3. Add milk gradually, mixing to a soft dough.
4. Roll lightly to one-half inch in thickness, cut into small biscuits.
5. Bake in a hot oven 12 to 15 minutes.
