The readers of "Collier's Weekly" who have followed the series of Rudyard Kipling's "Letters to the Family" will be interested to learn that a young Island writer has succeeded in entering the distinguished circle of that exclusive publication. The St. John Telegraph publishes a Norton despatch of the 30th ult., which says: "This morning at 6 o'clock, while getting up to go to work, John McKinnon dropped dead from heart disease. He had not been working all the week but was about all day, complaining only of general weakness. His death is a great shock to the community and the stricken family have much sympathy. The deceased was born in P. E. Island nearly fifty-six years ago and, with his parents, moved to Scotch settlement, Westmorland county, where he spent his boyhood. He worked at the blacksmith business until two years ago, since when he had been employed in the branch railroad shops. Three brothers Donald, of Scotch settlement; Angus of Norwood (Mass.), and Malcolm, of Moncton; and three sisters, Mrs. Jonah, of Norwood; Mrs. Conley, of Boston, and Mrs. J. E. Trites, of Moncton, and his mother, who is now more than ninety years of age, survive him. His wife, who was Miss Beek, of Salisbury, five sons, Fred, Howard, Alfred, Clifford and Harry, also four daughters, Bertha, Blanche, Mary and Jennie, also survive. His sister, Mrs. Trites, and his nephew, Alex. McKinnon, of Moncton, arrived here this afternoon. Mr. McKinnon was a member of the I.O.F. and I.O.O.F. For many years he had been the deputy of Fidelity Lodge I.O.G.T., which office he held at the time of his death. He was an active Christian worker and a member of the Presbyterian church. The funeral will be held to the Kirk cemetery on Monday afternoon. Rev. Frank Baird, of Sussex, will officiate. The Good Templars will also conduct services in connection with the obsequies.

F. W. Hyndman of this City yesterday received a telegram announcing that the "Harland" sailed yesterday morning at eleven o'clock from Yarmouth N. S. the weather being clear and fine and is due to arrive in Charlottetown tomorrow at noon. The splendid new steamer Harland, just completed by the New Burrell-Johnson Iron Co., made her trial trip from Yarmouth to Charlottetown under command of Captain Norman McKinnon going out as far as Chebogue Point. On the return trip the log was thrown over and the average speed from the Point to the Cape was a little better than 10 1/2 knots. She is specially fitted for excursions, and her spacious, airy and tastefully decorated saloon admirably fits her for the business. She has comfortable state-rooms, dining saloon, lavatory and other conveniences. She is owned by the Island Tug Company of Charlottetown, P. E. I., and F. W.
