If the Derby alone were in view this period of training would last about 18 months before the race. So the minimum training costs would be \$2,000. This does not include any entrance fee for two-year-old races, or travelling expenses. The actual entry fee for the Derby is \$500. With several of the big owners, who race on a lavish scale, overland expenses are very high. Lord Derby once estimated that it cost him about \$2,500 to keep each horse in training. Derby winners are of great value to their fortunate owners even if they never race again. Call Boy, after winning the Derby of 1927, was sold for \$300,000. Winners of big English classic races are rarely kept more than three years on the turf, as many owners consider such horses more valuable at the stud. Nowadays Derby winners command a stud fee between \$1,500 and \$2,000. The subscription list is pretty certain to be filled for several years to some or at all events until he has shown that he is not a success as a sire. Careful breeders limit their horse to about 20 mares for the first season or two, after which about double that number is considered reasonable. Hence a high-class stallion can earn about \$80,000 a year. The record sum ever earned by a sire in England is probably held by St. Simon, which for some unknown reason was not entered for the Derby. He was bought for about \$10,000 as a two-year-old and was never beaten on a race track. In 22 years as a sire he is estimated to have earned nearly \$1,250,000 in fees.
