Project to Surpass Arizona's Great Dam

(United Press)

HIGH BRIDGE, Ky., Dec. 7.—Construction has been commenced of the Dix River dam, near here, which when completed will surpass the Roosevelt dam in Arizona, according to engineers. It will be larger and will be capable of developing 30,000 horsepower as compared with 23,000 horsepower of the Roosevelt dam.

For the last 14 years engineers of international reputation have acclaimed the location an ideal place to build a high dam.

The project, when completed about February 1, 1925, will tower 270 feet between the rugged cliffs of Dix river gorge and will be the highest dam east of the Rocky Mountains, it is announced. The cost will be \$7,000,000. More than 1,600,000 cubic yards of material will be used in its construction. It will be 700 feet thick at the base, tapering to 24 feet, and 760 feet wide at the top. Its backwater will form a lake 38 miles long, storing approximately 6,000,000,000 cubic feet of water.

Scientific calculations were made for 12 years by prominent engineers from many parts of the world who checked and rechecked calculations and estimates and at last approved the hydro-electric development project. Arthur F. Davis, an engineer of international reputation, who planned and built the Roosevelt dam, is associated with L. F. Harza, and other engineers in building the Dix dam.

AGED SUFFRAGE WORKER ESCAPED INJURY IN JAPANESE EARTHQUAKE

TOKIO, Dec. 7.—One of those who escaped bodily harm in the Japanese earthquake and fire was Madame Kajiko Yajima, the 90-year-old suffrage advocate and president of the Japanese Christian Women's Temperance Society. After her home had been damaged by the earthquake she was removed by 10 girls to the residence of Marquis Kuroud, when she was obliged to flee, because of fire, to the First Regiment barracks. Later she was assisted to the Women's Refuge Home.

MIGHTY ATOM OF THE ZOO

LONDON, December, 5.—In a two bedroomed residence in the Rodent House at the Zoo is gathered the strangest collection of monkeys in the gardens, with a dorsal hyrax thrown in.

Most of them are new arrivals, and rarities at the menagerie. Apart from hyrax which resembles a large shaggy guinea pig Gumm, a mournful black howler monkey, who makes the night hideous with his discordant yells, and a specimen of the smallest cercopitheque in the world, the company is composed of squirrel-like marmosets.

Their constant twittering cries suggest an aviary rather than a monkey-house, and give some idea of how these little creatures must enliven the gloomy South American forest.

RESEMBLING LIONS.

Far the most beautiful, and noisy, are two fox marmosets, whose silky manes and bright yellow furs give them a resemblance to miniature Lions.

But the pride of the house is Mite, a pygmy marmoset, the smallest species of monkey known to exist. He arrived a day or two ago.

Measuring scarcely seven inches Mite weighs only three ounces. His diminutive size gives him many advantages over his companions, for when they find the circular entrances of the two sleeping-boxes blocked by the head of an inquisitive occupant, Mite can always manage to squeeze

Recalls Days of P. E. I. Ice Boats

SACKVILLE, Dec. 7.—The perils of crossing between Prince Edward Island and Cape Tormentine by ice-boats in the earlier days of winter communication are recalled by the death of Capt. Elphinstone Muttart, which occurred recently at the residence of his son-in-law, W. S. Steeves, of Summerside. Captain Muttart was well known in eastern Westmorland and news of his death was received with many regrets by a large circle of friends who hold him in high esteem.

Mr. Muttart possessed a congenial disposition, was always gentle and kind, and ever willing to extend helping hand to his neighbors. He was a man of sterling character and was a generous host.

Liff, as he was generally known, was a son of the late Capt. Lewis Muttart, Cape Traverse.

During the early days and when the only winter communication with the mainland was by ice-boats, which were maintained between Cape Traverse and Cape Tormentine by his father and the late Captain Arthur Irvine, also of Cape Traverse, he took a very active part.

For eighteen years of actual service, during which time he was captain, his judgment in protecting passengers from the many perils connected with that service was considered the very best.

SEEK CHESTNUT TREES TO RESIST LOCAL BLIGHT

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—To combat the chestnut blight which is now sweeping through the East and South Atlantic States and threatening to destroy entirely the American chestnut, forestry specialists of the Department of Agriculture are conducting experiments to find a species that will be a substitute for the American species and resist the blight.

One of the department's agricultural explorers is searching the Himalayas, uplands for new species and varieties of chestnut for trying out in this country. Two small plantings of a Chinese chestnut have been made on the natural Bridge National Forest in Virginia, and two plantings of an Indian chestnut have been made in the Florida National Forest.

An Indian chestnut from the mountain of Bengal is looked upon with favor, and a Japanese chestnut has been found to be a good blight resister, but yields a bitter tasting nut. The American chinquain is being cross-bred to develop a blight resister. The experimental work will require some time before any definite results can be obtained.
