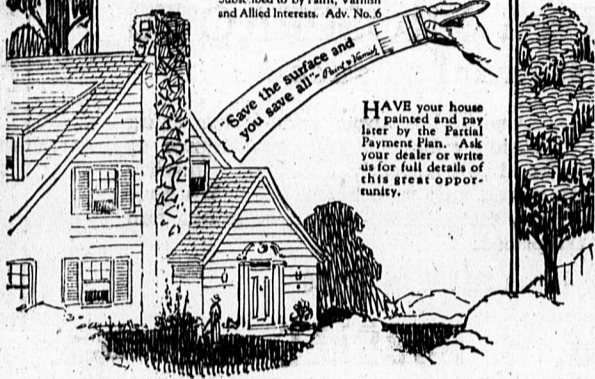

In answer to a series of questions by George Black, Conservative, Yukon, in the House of Commons this afternoon, Hon. J. A. Robb, acting Minister of Finance, stated that a large quantity of silver had been minted during the war and demobilization period. There had been a sufficient supply to last till the present time. The mint, said Mr. Robb, had been engaged on bronze and nickel coinage and the refining of gold.

Says Progressives Were Weak Kneed WINNIPEG, May 5. - Echoes of the federal budget vote find expression in an editorial appearing in this week's issue of the Grain Growers' and United Farmers' of Manitoba in which the seventeen Progressives who voted with the government are characterized as "weak kneed" and severely taken to task for throwing their lot for a "stand-pat" budget. The editorial continues: "Had all the members remained true to the low tariff policy, upon which they were elected, the government could not have escaped with a majority greater than one, and it would have profoundly affected the future tariff policy of the Liberal Party. "The satisfaction of the Liberal leaders must have been supreme, when from Saskatchewan and Alberta five members voted for a continuation of a burden which the protective tariff imposes upon the people of the Prairies."
