OTTAWA, Dec. 21.—Capt. Tailor, Port Warden of Vancouver, will be relieved of his duties pending inquiry by the Department of Marine and Fisheries into complaints by Vancouver Board of Trade that ships have been permitted to go to sea improperly loaded.

OTTAWA, Dec. 21.—(Eggs)—Increasing receipts are bringing an easier tendency on the Toronto egg market. The Vancouver market is also declining under heavier production. Poultry prices remain firm and unchanged.

Toronto shippers report increased receipts paying extras 55, firsts 40, seconds 25, firsts 41, seconds 32 f.o.b. Montreal is unchanged. Winnipeg is unchanged. Edmonton egg market receipts are very light fresh extras jobbing 65, first 60, storage extras 46, firsts 40, seconds 35. Poultry market firm with receipts light, dealers quoting from 27 to 29 for No. 1 dressed turkeys. Live chickens, 14 fowl 12. Calgary turkeys are very plentiful. Live over 11 pounds 20c 8 pounds and over 18c, 6 to 8 pounds, 15c. Eggs are very scarce. Jobbing storage extras \$12.90 firsts \$12.00, seconds \$9.90. Vancouver eggs are lower and unsettled. Dealers are paying country points extras 40, firsts 38, jobbing fresh extras 44.97, points extras 44, firsts 42, seconds and pullets 36. Charlottetown, P. E. I. receipts light market tendency lower wholesalers paying country points extras 55, firsts 45, seconds chickens 22 to 30, geese 18, turkeys dressed 35 to 38 S. John N. B. unchanged, Halifax N. S. unchanged.

Refuse Protection For Iron And Steel Industry

(Special to The Guardian)

LONDON, Dec. 21.—Premier Baldwin stated in the House of Commons today that it was impossible to grant the application of the iron and steel companies for protection under the safeguarding of Industries procedure. This means that the government does not think it wise to impose import duties to assist this industry.

The Premier said a research committee had given the subject prolonged and detailed consideration hearing a large number of witnesses engaged in the iron, steel and allied trades. The evidence had revealed a serious situation but at the same time the investigations and made it clear that the safeguarding of a basic industry of such magnitude would have such a wide effect that it would come into conflict with the government's declarations regarding the general tariff.

There was comparatively light offering of cattle and very little interest shown. Few sales made would indicate values about as follows:

Quotations: Butcher steers, medium, \$5.75 to \$6.25 common \$3.50 to \$4.25, butcher cows good \$4.75 to \$5.25, medium \$3.00 to \$4.00, common nil grassers \$5.00 to \$5.25, Sheep receipts 2,729.

There were very few good lambs and demand was poor. A few good lambs sold for twelve fifty and others twelve twenty-five. Mixed lots of common and heavy buck lambs sold for eleven dollars and better ones eleven fifty. Sheep sold at five dollars to six seventy-five.

Quotations: Ewes \$5.00 to \$6.75, lambs good \$12.00 to \$12.50, common \$11.00 to \$11.50.
