BARES HUN HYPOCRISY

Always Free on Seas Until This War Came

The New York World tells a few liberty truths to Germany as follows: It is an affront to ordinary intelligence to talk of Germany on the ocean before this war as a tenant of England. Germany's peace freedom of the seas was as complete as that of England or any other nation. It will never be more complete; and in that old freedom of the seas Germany's steam shipping more than doubled in ten years before the war, against a British increase of less than 65 per cent, and the German foreign commerce expanded by leaps and bounds, with England as the greatest customer. What splendid basket of eggs is now spilled or is spilling. This is why the war is so especially idiotic for Germany. Germany will get back on the ocean again. No doubt of that. But it will take time, and costly effort, and those who were Germany's best customers before the war will not be so after. New currents of trade must be developed, and those shipping subsidies which Herr Ballin seems to bet on in meeting or overcoming competitors whose war profits are of "fantastic height," may not be generous from a Government bled white by war and a people toiling under a crushing burden of war taxation. There is nothing in the outlook which should cause these competitors to tremble. They are agreed with Herr Ballin that it has been an idiotic war—especially for Germany on the

Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations

The sole head of a family on any state over sixteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Entries—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Reside six months in each of three years cultivate 20 acres and erect a house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

The auditors R. V. Longworth and Thomas M. MacMillan reported that they had audited the books and vouchers in the offices of the City Clerk, Water Commissioners, Police Court, School Board and City Weigh Scales and found them all correct.

The Sinking Funds and Current Account balances in the Bank all agree with the Bank Pass Books.

The Clerical work in the City Clerk's Office and in the office of the Water Commissioners is very heavy and is carried on in a most satisfactory and efficient manner by Mr. W. W. Clarke, the City Clerk, and Mr. J. A. MacMillan, Accountant of the Water Commissioners' Office. Mr. VanDerstine, the city collector, accomplishes a great amount of work and is a most obliging and painstaking official. The auditors also directed attention to the loss of revenue to the city by the non-payment of poll tax by numbers of young men who evade this duty while enjoying all the privileges of the tax-paying citizen.

HOW TO LOSE CONFLICT

LONDON, February 13.—The Daily Mail publishes the following strong editorial on the situation at Salonika under the caption "How to Lose The War. By Playing Into The Enemy's Hands!"

The Salonika expedition has involved the Allies by chronic commitments in men, money and shipping. Soldiers in Great Britain, France, and Italy are unskilled. They feel that the men and munitions diverted to this corner of the Balkans could be employed elsewhere with far greater effect.

They point out that Salonika is exceedingly unhealthy and that the country round it has neither roads nor railways, with the exception of one badly laid and miserably equipped line.

Macedonia is like the Spain of the Peninsula War: a country where small armies are defeated and large armies starve.

The despatch of large Allied forces to Salonika suits the Germans admirably. It is playing the Germans game. It helps the enemy to blockade us in two ways.

First, it absorbs an enormous tonnage of shipping, which means scarcity of food in Great Britain—because vessels not only are required to carry the troops but also must be constantly employed to bring their munitions and supplies. Estimates drawn up before the war indicate that about 3 tons of shipping per man are permanently needed to keep an expeditionary force in the field at a distant base.

Second, the projection of the long line of communications between Great Britain and Salonika—a distance of some 3,000 miles by sea—makes serious demands on the British Navy and hampers it in dealing with submarine attacks in other directions. Moreover it weakens the Allies on the western front, where the Germans, as they well know, are most vulnerable—where the climate is good, railways are abundant, roads are plentiful, and heavy artillery and ordinary railway and motor transport are capable of being used with the utmost effect.

It is, then, all-important that at this great parting of the ways the Salonika school should be asked plainly to tell us exactly what the force at Salonika has done, what it is there for, and what purpose it can serve there.

It can hardly be a pure accident that military opinion both in France and Great Britain is so strongly opposed to the expedition.

If the soldiers are right—and we have learned by bitter experience that

this is a war for soldiers and not for politicians—we may, by clinging to the plans which Mr. Asquith and Viscount Grey bequeathed to us, for fear the success of our spring offensive in the west; we may, in short, lose the war.

The Allied Army was not despatched to Salonika when it could have saved Serbia. It was not sent until the then Greek Government had asked for an Allied force of 150,000 men; and by the time it began to arrive the Greek Government had changed its mind.

Mr. Asquith's Administration added to its commitments without asking what it meant to do.

Surely Antwerp, Gallipoli and Kut have shown that to waste force at points which are not vital is the surest road to defeat.

The principle which should control all our plans is the soldiers' plan—

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 13.—The Marquis of Aberdeen, former Governor-General of Canada, in an address at dinner of the League to Enforce Peace here, said every British subject could join in the welcome "which has been so widely and heartily accorded in Great Britain to the announcement that the United States has taken up the challenge passed down by Germany, thus leading the neutral nations in championing the enforcement of

respect for international law and right."

Lord Aberdeen said that although the manifestation in England over this country's action was hearty, there was no attempt to exert or hurry the United States toward a further momentous step. "This," he said, "furnishes one more proof of that respectful and cordial friendliness toward this country which, I insist, is the prevalent attitude of the British people."

In approving the objects of the League to Enforce Peace, the Marquis said it was very encouraging to observe that there appeared to be an increasing consensus of opinion as to the need of such a movement. Continuing, he said:

"We have often heard of preparedness for war, but for peace too there must be preparation, especially in the formation and development of a united public opinion to operate through the national representatives, who will be called upon to take the actual part in the adjustment of terms after the war. Therefore we must work toward making the volume of opinion as complete as possible."

"The true analogy for describing the meaning and method of the sequel is that of the police, the use of force, but not that of aggression; and, quoting Mr. Lloyd George, the security for peace will be that the nations will band themselves together to punish the first peace breaker that comes out."
