LES CANADIENS STRENGTHENED FOR N. L. RACE

"Flying Frenchmen" Picked to Make Play-offs Again This Season.

MONTREAL, Nov. 18—National Hockey League clubs that comprise the Canadian section of the major outfit, are supposed to be starting off a new season with added strength and the promise of a closer race than last year. Time will tell whether this is so, as it tells about everything else.

Les Canadiens have made a number of changes. Wasnie comes up from the minors to try and fill Gagne's shoes. It is a tough assignment.

Gordon Fraser shaped up well in practice and he will make the grade. Gerald Carson comes back for another trial, but I believe he will be found playing in Providence before the season is far under way. Larochele also is on trial and might hold on.

Howie Morenz is in the "pink" and ready for a great season. The fact that this player is the greatest star in the game cannot be taken away from him, yet. No other player has popped up to dim his light, and he is far from slipping. Howie will be out in front as a goal scorer and make every hopeful in the league travel some to keep up with him. Barring accidents, Morenz will be the big attraction in professional hockey this season, which is as usual.

Joliat as Runner Up.

Joliat runs Morenz a close second for the star honors of the league. He says he is ready for a successful season and he looks it. This tricky "mite" has the greatest market value in the National League and many offers have been made to buy him. The chances to buy him are about the same as buying Babe Ruth from the Yankees.

Wasnie, a newcomer, has to race alongside of these two stars and that is asking plenty from a minor league player. Whether he can hold up with this outfit remains to be seen. If he makes the grade, Les Canadiens will again have the best front line in the league.

Mondie will be a sensation this season. He was coming strong at the finish last year and has stepped right in this fall where he left off. This youngster is a great goal getter and smart puck carrier. He fills in a second line with that great poke-checker, Pete Lepine, and if the other wing of this line shows anything the rellier will hold up the speed of the first line and under the new rules make this a tough club to beat.

Mantha and Burke have the defense positions. Burke is in his third year as a major leaguer and is just about seasoned right. He is a tough and game player that can stop the best of them and as a body checker he has few equals. Body checking is a value and Burke has made it a science.

WORKOUT FOR HIP LOCK IS ABS TONIGHT

Brookfield Claims Methods Used by Winners Were Illegal.

SACKVILLE, N. B., Nov. 18—"Will they pull again?" "Do you think Sackville will drop the hip lock?" "Where will it be?" These and many other similar questions is what one hears in the stores and on the corners these days. It's not basketball, football or hockey, they are talking just now, its tug of war, and how they do talk it. The rules of the tug of war tournament conducted in game are known but slightly and the arguments pro and con concerning the hip lock used by the Sackville team and to which Brookfield objects, are many and varied.

What it's all about. For the benefit of those who did not follow the tug of war tournament conducted in the arena during the winter fair at Amherst, and which was perhaps the biggest drawing card of the week, the following will suffice. Some seven tug of war teams from Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia entered the annual tournament to compete for the five hundred dollar purse. The Sackville and Brookfield teams remained as finalists on the last night, with the Nova Scotia champions as favorites on account of their experience. After pulling some ten minutes, before a packed arena, and with excitement at fever pitch, Sackville started to gain ground, only to have the webbing of the Brookfield anchor mar break and the pull halted. Opinion about the number of men over the line at the critical moment differs but it seems to be an accepted fact that three Brookfield men had been drawn over. After a prolonged discussion between the teams and officials the Sackville team was awarded first money and the championship of the tournament. Brookfield objects to the hip lock used by the New Brunswick team and has issued a challenge in Halifax Herald on Nov. 16 to Sackville saying they are ready to meet them anywhere at a time with the knee and hip lock barred.

Sackville now replies that they would be pleased to meet the Nova Scotia champions again, but that they cannot see any reason in abandoning the hip lock, which they maintain is perfectly legal and according to their coach, George Lawrence, was a favorite lock used by the Canadian soldiers while overseas. (Mr. Lawrence was a member of the champion Canadian team The Sackville team was assembled only a couple of weeks before tournament opened, by Thayer Pett, the captain. Mr. Lawrence coached the team, paying particular attention to the lock protested Brookfield. He states that there is nothing in the rules of tug of war that prevents them from using and asks why Brookfield should try to upon themselves to dictate the rules of the game.

College football has all but completely eclipsed wrestling as a sport in which eye-puzzling and tongue-twisting names abound. Those "z," "c," "y," and "r" combinations certainly show the growing Slavic influence on the grid from coast to coast. The East has its Pieculewicz of Fordham and the West has its Lubratovich of Wisconsin with a host of others whose names betoken nationalities hardly identified with football until four or five years ago. So marked has this football influx become, that last season certain sport writers picked "All-Foreign All-American" teams which were of stellar caliber indeed.

Sturdy second and third generation sons of hardy Slavic, Teuton and Latin ancestry have been manufacturing in ever increasing numbers, especially in the big Western and Mid-Western universities. They are husky gridiron naturals—with the strength and courage of forefathers born to rigorous muscle-building toil.

Coach Frank Cavanaugh, of Fordham, was among the first to recognize the potency of this so-called "foreign element." Four years ago

the canny "Cav" remarked to a friend: "Some wise alecks call those fellows 'bohunks,' but as a class they offer the best football timber ever. They're strong, game, anxious to learn, and—according to American high school standards—genuinely intelligent. They have the new blood that is needed to add more life to football."

Cavanaugh, practicing what he preached, is building Fordham into formidable football proportions. His battering "Rams" have Pieculewicz, Wisniewski, Elcewicz, Miskinis, Klompberg, Sianos and other such in the lineup this season. Sounds like one of "The Big Ten" teams, with their Bueschenschuss, Ujhelyi, Kazmerchak, of Ohio State; Magnabasco and Hojnacki, of Indiana; Pulkrabek, Kekela and Oja, of Minnesota; Yanuskus and Nusspekel, of Illinois; Lubratovich and Katelaar, of Wisconsin; Capt. Joe Truskowski, of Michigan, etc. etc. The latter, Fordham's "Peck," Wisconsin's "Lub," and the wonderful Toby Uansa, Pittsburgh back are gridiron stars of the first magnitude.
