Canny Stories By Lord Aberdeen

ST. ANDREW'S SOCIETIES GOOD WORK--VALUE OF SCOTLAND'S HERITAGE.

In the last public appearance Lord Aberdeen was in story telling mood in speaking at a St. Andrew's Society dinner in Glasgow. He also referred to the movement for a Scottish Renaissance.

I would like to mention, said Lord Aberdeen, that Dr. J. Malcolm Bulloch, who may justly be regarded as an authority upon matters relating to the various branches of your Society's operations, has recently contributed some interesting suggestions, in relation to the influence which may be exercised by the recognition of what comes under the general designation of the Scottish vernacular, especially as a sort of conveyance of the pith and point of various Scottish ideas and habits of thought; and none the less, because of the curious variety of what comes under the head of the vernacular which exists in different parts of the country.

The Aberdonian Brought--

The latest specimen of the Aberdonian reputation, continued Lord Aberdeen, I heard last Tuesday. It was simply that a man living in, or near, Aberdeen, invited four acquaintances to come to supper with him--one an Englishman, another an Irishman, the third a Welshman, and the fourth an Aberdonian. Each of the guests was invited to bring something with him. The Englishman brought a bottle of whiskey; the Irishman a pot of tobacco; the Welshman a box of cigars; the Aberdonian brought his brother.

"Dinna Boast"

Another story recounted concerned a Scottish girl who obtained a situation in the south of England. One day her employer said to her, "Annie, of course I know you are Scottish by your accent, but I have never asked you from which part of Scotland you came." To this, the girl replied, "I come frae near Aberdeen, M'em." "Oh," said the lady, "I'm sorry I didn't know that, for I have friends living near Aberdeen, and I would have asked you about them, but I think they are away now. Why didn't you mention where your home was sooner?" "Weel, M'em, I didna like tae dee that, for I'an I wis leavin' hame, ma mither said, 'Noo, Annie, be sure an' dinna boast.'" (Laughter.)

The Real Value

When Scots gather all over the world on such occasions as St. Andrew's Day, continued Lord Aberdeen, doubtless their thankfulness with regard to their connection with Scotland leads them to use expressions which seem like boastfulness. But I believe that societies such as yours which, for the past forty years has been training its members to study and appreciate the beauties of Scotland and its history, the literature and the essential characteristics of the Scottish race, create a sense of the real value of the heritage which it is our high responsibility to preserve and hand on to future generations.

Scottish Renaissance

Any of us who have lived in outlying regions--in Canada or the United States, Australia or New Zealand--will know how, when some newcomers arrive in the district to seek work, or to acquire land, and who have the reputation of hailing from Scotland, they are always accorded a warm welcome, and are expected to "make good." This is a great asset for our Scottish boys and girls to possess, and it is indeed encouraging to know that the value of this Scottish heritage which your Society have so carefully cherished, is now being increasingly recognized by the movement for a Scottish Renaissance, which is making itself felt in so many ways in our midst, by whatever name it may be called. It has come not one whit too soon, and I congratulate your Society in being a pioneer in a movement.

As a means to crop improvement, creating and securing the general use of seed of assured quality is an immeasurably greater and less costly factor than the application of legislative control, which has for its objective the suppression of the sale of inferior seed.

Criminals Change With Crime Modes

HALIFAX, March 12. (C.P.)--Governor George Grant of the Halifax city prison thinks the world is "getting no better" as far as crime is concerned.

The type of criminal has changed, the white-haired governor says in reminding on the 4th anniversary of his affiliation with the institution, but so has the mode of crime. "They were good in the good old days. In those days they went to jail mainly for fighting and drunkenness. Particularly when army and naval forces were quartered here. It was customary in those days for citizens and men in uniform to tangle in one way or another during drinking bouts--and generally the man in uniform ended up as guest of Governor Grant."

But today, "they're sicker, they're prisoners. They're better educated and have better judgment. When they plan to escape they're harder to frustrate than in the days when the ordinary prisoner was usually a blustering fellow, so a closer eye has to be kept on them."

From his long study of crime and its perpetrators, Governor Grant thinks there is more "breaking and entering now than years ago. Yes, and there are more men in jail for failing to provide for their families. Of course, that's partly due to hard times."
