drop right and left. Somehow a few managed to get to the objective.
Those of us who were hit lay out in an open field with no cover. Whenever any of the wounded Germans opened up and the stuff was flying all around us. Some of the Bochs even crept up another bloody dyke and lobbed hand grenades among us. I could hear German voices distinctly. I thought they were going to polish all of us off as we lay on the ground, practically surrounded, and pretending to be dead. You couldn't help any of the wounded because anyone who moved attracted a burst of fire.
Those of us who later got back lay out there for more than four hours, until dark, and then crawled back. The stretcher bearers were there able to come out. It was a grim day alright for the whole battalion; all the company and most of the platoon commanders were causal among us.
The Canadian Army is running through a hell of a lot of officers and men, and all the politicians lie who say that reinforcements are adequate and well trained. The truth is (ask anyone who has been up at the front and not just at Headquarters) that they are poorly trained. They are dragging them into the infantry from everywhere in order to keep up our strength, and then they can only keep us about two-thirds up in strength, by hardly ever giving the lads at the front a rest.
I am feeling not too bad and will write again soon.

ARMY CADETS CORPS NEWS
THE NEW R.C.A.C. FLAG
The new flag of the Royal Canadian Army Cadets Corps is of white silk representing the white field of Canada, with fringe cord and tassels of red and white, the authorized Canadian colors. The size is the same as approved for Canadian Infantry. In the center is the official Royal Canadian Army Cadets red maple leaf, with the title "R.C.A.C." superimposed thereon, surmounted by the Imperial Crowns. Directly below the Maple Leaf and gold inwards is the scroll in red with the cadet motto "Acer Asportat" As the Maple So the Scrolling in green. Below the scroll is the number of the Cadet Corps in black Arabic Numerals. Any organization or individuals interested in the esprit de corps of the local army cadets might consider assistance in the purchase of this flag a fitting token of their interest.
FLAG ETIQUETTE
These rules, and others to follow, govern the disposition of the Union Jack.
The Flag is flown so that the broad band of white is on top and so that the staff is on the side of the flag nearer this broad band. This rule applies whatever the position of the staff. If the narrow band of white is in the above position, a signal of distress is being given.
No other flag is to be higher or bigger than the Jack. On no occasions do other flags take precedence of The Jack.
When the flag is flown on a staff, it is to be flown at the full height of the staff. For mourning, The Flag is first raised to the full height of the staff and then lowered the width of one flag. The flag must then be raised to the full height of the staff before being lowered.
