## BOMB THROWER'S EXPERIENCES

Mrs. Ernest S. Griffin, Albany, has received the following letter from her son, Brenton Davey, now at the front.

Belgium, April 17, 1916  
Dear Mother—Just a line to let you know I am still in the land of the living, am writing this in the trenches after three days exciting circumstances. I am corporal of a bomb section now and have been on a listening post for the past three nights where you've got to use your head when you see a Hun. Sometimes they make it warm for us, but we make it hot for them also. Our only trouble now is that we never see a paper and we hear all kinds of rumors, but we only have a few weeks of this life at a time. We encountered quite a lot of rain so far, but we shall have fine weather soon.

There is eight other fellows in the dug-out with me catching a little sleep. We sleep in the day time and work at night. That is what makes life so interesting. Such a contrast to civilian life. Suppose spring has started at home by now. Been so long in this country nearly forget what spring looks like at home. It looks like a river draining itself off in Flanders. From where I am writing I can see a famous city being shelled, but wait till we get on the Boches side and you will see some of their towns going to the wall. Such is life in war time. Never heard from any one at home for over a month, but may be they are on the way as it takes over a month for a letter to come. Well mother, my time is limited as I have to make tea before going out again. Best love to all. Your loving son

Dear Mother—Just a few lines this evening before I go to bed to let you know that I am quite well and hope this will find you all the same. We are back from the trenches again for a short rest. Our Battalion was in for about 16 days, so it is nice to get back again where we can get a good night's sleep. It is a long march from the front line to our Rest Camp and it was pretty late when we got relieved and when we reached here it was daylight. We were all pretty

tired and hungry—as well but the cook had our breakfast ready for us when we arrived, so we had something to eat and went to bed. Well mother I told you in my last letter that we had moved to another part of the line. Well the troops that were here before—we came told us that it was an awful place but we didn't find it half as bad as they said it was. Of course it is pretty lively sometimes. The trenches are much closer together here than they were at the last place. The part of the line we held was about as far apart as from our house to where the old barn used to be so we had to be careful of being caught by snipers as they are always on the look out for a move. They didn't shell hard to get to range when the trenches are so close together. If one happens to drop short it gets their own trenches. Well I never saw such rats in my life as they are in the trenches. They are as big as cats and the place is alive with them and they are quite tame when they are in the trenches. They come right up to you. Well mother it is now time for the lights to go out so I will finish this tomorrow.

I think I have written about enough for this time. I got ten letters now since I have written one. I don't expect to get time to answer one half of them. Good bye with love from your son
