Quebec Labor Code May Be Shelved For Year

QUEBEC, Jan. 31 — (CP) — Final action by the Quebec Legislature on the contentious provincial labor code draft may be put off until next year, it was learned today.

Labor Minister Antonio Barrette said in a statement last night it is "within the realm of possibility" that the government may hold up bill no. 5, containing the 324-clause draft, until the 1950 legislature session.

Labor circles said today the bill would not necessarily be withdrawn by the government whose spokesmen have insisted right along that the code draft is simply a proposal, subject to amendment.

The bill would bar from holding union office any person known to be a Communist or connected with subversive activity. It would outlaw sympathy strikes and necessitate a secret ballot before any strike could be called.

In the meantime, labor organizations which have criticized terms of the draft and are arranging campaigns to fight its enactment, would be given time to recommend amendments to the government.
