## RAILWAY OFFICIALS

### Visit the Eastern Part of Province

## DELIGHTFUL SCENERY

### Improvements to be Made--Station House to be Moved.

As intimated yesterday morning Mr. Schreiber, Deputy Minister of Railways, and other officials accompanying him, made a tour of inspection of the Railway Line, east of Charlottetown running to Souris first, thence to Georgetown. The visiting Railway men, together with the ladies of the party were delighted beyond measure with the trip. The day was an ideal one for a run through this beautiful Country, and the strangers were not slow to appreciate the delightful climate and bracing air of the Sea-girt Province. They were particularly struck with the landscape along St. Peter's Bay, which is without doubt one of the most beautifully situated localities to be found in the whole country. Arriving at Souris, the deep water terminus was duly inspected, after which some of the party went out on the Breakwater, while others ascended the high promontory on which the lighthouse is located and sought out the veteran light keeper, who readily opened the door for the party who made the ascent to the lantern tower. From here a magnificent view of the Bay, the villages of Souris West, and of the adjoining country for many miles was obtained. Lunch was partaken of at the Sea View Hotel, and many expressions of satisfaction were uttered by the visitors at the excellence of the meal provided by Mrs. Cox. The hotel coach was filled to overflowing by the happy throng and the double team, guided by the hands of one of the young ladies of the party, was driven by a circuitous route round by the hill on which the handsome residence owned by Lieut. Governor McIntyre, and now occupied by Mr. J. J. Hughes, M. P., is located. From this vantage ground those who did not make the ascent of the lighthouse obtained a splendid panoramic view of the valleys and surroundings, as far south as Boughton Island. The magnificent sheet of water forming Georgetown Harbor was viewed with delight by the visitors and the winter port was voted all right. The inconveniences hitherto experienced for lack of facilities for handling the largely increasing winter traffic at Georgetown will be remedied to some small extent at least by the erection, this season of suitable ticket office and waiting room on the wharf, and the throwing of the old office into the warehouse, thus slightly enlarging the latter. The need of a new station was also noted. The party returned to Charlottetown in the evening having thoroughly enjoyed every hour of the day. Mr. and Mrs. Sharp were assiduous as their efforts to make the run as enjoyable as possible for the distinguished party of visiting Railway men and the ladies accompanying them, and the local contingent duly appreciate the generosity of the Deputy Minister and his amiable lady.



**GETTING BACK TO WORK.**

**LONDON, July 2.**—The mining interests in South Africa, according to well-informed men like Alfred Beit, are slowly improving. Johannesburg is filling up as rapidly as the railway can supply food for the workers, and one neglected property after another is resuming attention.

**ANOTHER KANSAS SMASHER.**

**LEAVENWORTH, Kansas July 22.**—Mrs. Mary E. Dickens surprised half a dozen men in John Beachler's policy shop here last night and before the latter recovered their composure, she smashed a policy wheel with a hatchet. Her boys had gambled in the place. She threatens to smash all policy shops in the city unless the authorities should close them.

**IN THE CONCENTRATION.**

**CAMPS IN SOUTH AFRICA.**

**LONDON, July 24.**—A parliamentary paper issued to-day gives the number of persons in the concentration camps in South Africa in June as follows: White, 85,410; colored, 23,480. There were 777 deaths among the whites in the camps, the list including 570 children. The death among the colored persons numbered five.

**IVORY PRODUCING COUNTRIES.**

Half a century ago all African ivory came from Egypt and Zanzibar, but to-day the Congo Free State holds the first rank among ivory producing countries. In 1899 no less than 370 tons were exported to Europe, this being more than half the total African output.

**LARGELY DUE TO DRUNKENNESS.**

In 120 army prisons throughout Germany 45 per cent. of all the murderers committed their crimes while under the influence of drink. Sixty-three per cent. of serious injury to persons, and 77 per cent. of criminal immorality and due to the same cause. In the navy, out of 1,671 punishable cases during the last six years, 75 per cent. of the most serious cases have been due to drunkenness.

Five dentists in the employ of the United States Government are performing duty in the Philippines; ten more are on their way there; one has been ordered to Cuba, one to Porto Rico, one to West Point, one to Fort Leavenworth and one to Fortress Monroe.
