IN MEMORIAM

MRS. ISABELLA McDONALD

Entered into rest at Bradalbane after a painful illness of five months, borne with patience and faith in Him who doeth all things well. All loving care and medical skill failed to stay the dread disease and on the morning of July 25, 1927, Isabella McDonald, widow of the late Donald McDonald, one of the most beloved and highly esteemed women of this community passed from this life to the life beyond. Born at Hopedale, Oct. 22, 1856, daughter of late Kenneth and Sarah McDonald of that place. In 1877 she married Donald McDonald, who predeceased her many years ago. Goss, New Bedford, Mass. Also two brothers, Alexander and D. M. McDonald, Hopedale. A large circle of relatives and friends will ever remember her kindly welcome and hospitality. Early in life, professing faith in Christ, she united with the Presbyterian Church and was a life member of the W. M. S. The largely attended funeral service at the home was conducted by Rev. David Coburn, assisted by Rev. Dr. Saint. Interment was made at Springton cemetery, Rev. Dr. Saint officiating. The pall bearers were James McSwain, Walter McKenzie, Angus McDonald, John A. McNelis, John A. McDonald and Norman McDonald. She has passed away from this earth, but the inspired word of her beautiful life and character has not passed away, but will remain as an inspiration to many hearts and lives.

Oxford Limitation On Women Students So far Unnecessary

(Canadian Press.)
OXFORD, Eng., July 19.—Since the Congregation of Oxford University decided to limit the enrollment of women to one for every four male students, much comment, derisive or humorous, has been indulged in. One thing meant as great as to justify the action for some time to come.

Women are hardly stronger at Oxford than at Cambridge. At Cambridge, in the recent examinations, their most ardent advocates could hardly say they were shining lights. The time when women could beat the men would seem to have passed. Even in modern and medieval languages, in which the women used to do better than the men so far as numbers were concerned, the women this year were left far behind.

The only Tripos in which the fair sex even held their own, was the recently introduced Geographical Tripos. In the second part of this Tripos one woman and one man share premier honors, while in the first part first-class honors are divided between five men and three women. Among the three women was Miss C. P. Smuts, daughter of General Jan C. Smuts. However, the co-ed as they would be called in Canada, may take heart from the remarkable success of Miss Gertrude E. Trevelyan, who is a first woman to win the Versé at Oxford. Miss Trevelyan declares she sent in the prize poem "for a joke" and that she had written very little of it before she attempted to win the prize. The winning effort was a poem of blank verse in the prescribed subject, "Julia, daughter of Claudius." Miss Newdigate is at Lady Margaret College, and her fellow-students were extremely gratified at her success.
