Everybody should go to New Glasgow the 24th. 4th Regiment Band in attendance. Schr. "Lady Franklin" arrived yesterday morning from Sydney C. B. with a cargo Reserve Runmine Coal for Peake Bros Co. Rev. Canon Simpson, city, leaves this morning to attend the Anglican Synod in Halifax. It is expected that this session of the Synod will not be a very protracted one.

Mrs L. E. Prowse has returned to this city from Ottawa. J. W. Carruthers, Montague, was at the Victoria Hotel Saturday. There were no Chicago Market Quotations in The Guardian's dispatches this morning. Pleasant-View, Hampton, will open as usual this summer under the same management as last year. At the Police Court in this City Saturday Daniel O'Brien was fined one dollar for assault on Edward Hurray.

The proceeds of the performances at the Bijou on Friday evening last were turned over to the two hospitals by the proprietor. This act of generosity was highly appreciated by the hospitals. Keith's theatre, the favorite resort of all tourists and visitors from this Province when in Boston has an exceptionally fine program for the present week. There will be two performances daily and artists of superior merit will perform. The team from the Victorias to play the New Glasgow team tomorrow will be picked from the following: Milford, McInnis, McMillan, McTague, Gillis, Saunders, Duffy, McKay, Stanway, Gillispie, McAnnon, McNeill, Jardine, Gay, Pickering and Robertson.

The many friends of Miss Blanche Murley, of this city, will be pleased to learn that she has graduated with high honors from the New England Deaconess Hospital, Boston. Miss Murley has served three years in this institution and is a daughter of the well known townsman Isaac Murley. The District meetings for the Charlottetown Methodist District is to be held at North Wiltshire on June 7th. Rev. Wm. Harrison chairman, and Rev. J. M. Rice, financial secretary. The Summerside district meeting takes place the following day in Summerside, Rev. Geo. Ross being chairman. The Fourth Regiment Rifle Association propose entering more vigorously into rifle shooting this year. With this end in view they are being supplied with two hundred new Ross rifles and have received fifteen thousand rounds of ammunition which will be issued to any member of the regiment on application to the Secretary and on payment of the small annual fee. The Inter-maritime match for rifle-men between New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island will be shot at St. John this year. Five of the eight members of the team from this Province have already been chosen and the remaining three will be selected by competition. The following are the men chosen so far: Major J. M. Jones, Capt. D. A. McKinnon, Sergeant E. McInnis, Sergt. J. A. Moore and Gr. A. W. Seaman. The match will be shot on Thursday, June 9th. Two inventive and practical young men of this city have established a wireless telegraphy outfit in the homes of their parents and have been transmitting and receiving messages at will during the past few days. Those referred to are Keith Rogers, Prince Street, and Harold Pickard, Bayfield Street, who purchased receiving and sending outfits and set up the instruments and necessary apparatus themselves. Their operations are carried on at a distance of a little less than half a mile. They went into their work with a great deal of enthusiasm and the results attained literally "speak for themselves."

The pleasure yacht Florence, of Toronto, steamed into port yesterday morning about eleven o'clock and docked at the Marine Wharf. This beautiful vessel, which is perhaps the most handsome and most luxuriously fitted and furnished ever seen in Charlottetown Harbor, is the newly acquired property of John C. Eaton, senior member of the firm of T. Eaton & Co., Toronto. Mr Eaton purchased the Florence from parties in New York by whom she had been used as a gasoline driven pleasure yacht. She has been entirely rebuilt and is not steam driven and is fitted with a wireless telegraphy apparatus equal in power to any wireless outfit on the transatlantic liners and superior to that of many ocean going vessels. She is of one hundred and twenty tons register and can travel at a speed of sixteen knots an hour. Mr Eaton and party with the crew of the Florence went to New York by rail and since leaving that port en route to Toronto have called at Boston, Halifax, Canso, Hawkesbury and Charlottetown. As the result of special services held some weeks ago, Rev. Charles H. Johnson, B. D., the pastor at River Philip, N. S., and well known in this Province, received five persons into the membership of the church. No 8 Company Fourth Regiment H. B. (formerly No 2 Co 4th C. A.) will hold its first company drill under the new name on Wednesday night. Applications for enrolment in this Company have been more numerous than ever before in its history. As already announced the name of the Fourth Regiment, Canadian Artillery here has been changed to the Fourth Regiment Heavy Brigade. The numbers of the Companies have also been changed—No 1 is changed to No 7; No 2 is changed to No 8 and No 3 is changed to No 9. The Brant returned to port Friday night, after visiting all the light-houses from Miscou to Shippegan, which were inspected by Col. W. P. Anderson, Chief Engineer of the Department of Marine and Fisheries, Ottawa. Col. Anderson left Saturday morning on return to Ottawa. The Eastern Steamship Company people will watch with interest the result of the experiment to be tried this season of burning oil on the tug-boats Harvard and Yale. If it is successful, it is probable that before long the steamers Belfast and Camden will also be burning oil. The Harvard and Yale will go on the Boston-New York run, on May 23.—St. John Globe. On the afternoon of May 24th the Daily Mail Overseas prize will be shot for in Charlottetown. Teams of eight men each from the Civilian and the Fourth Regiment Rifle Association are entered. The match will commence at two o'clock p. m.
