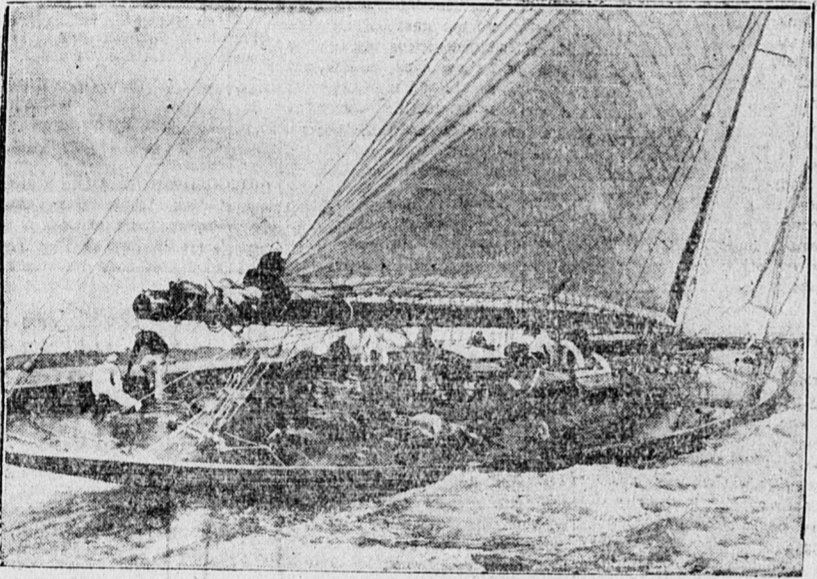

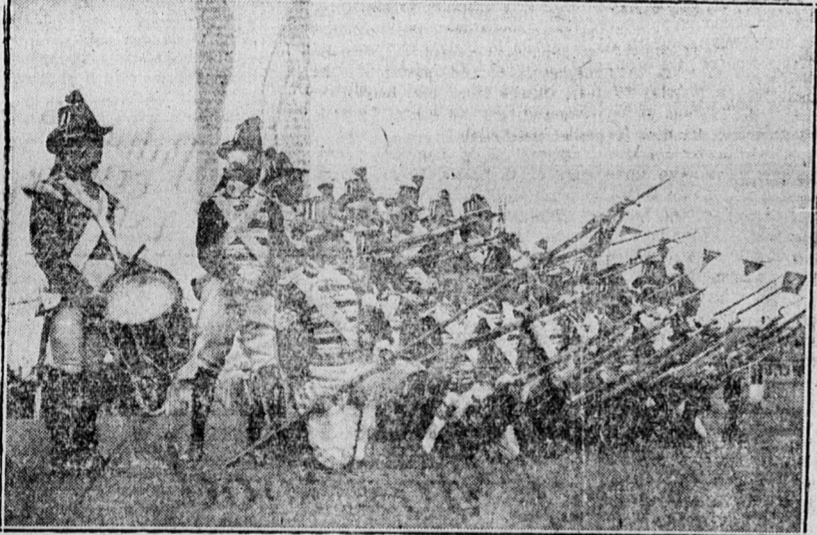
**SAILOR KING LENDS AN EXPERIENCED HAND**

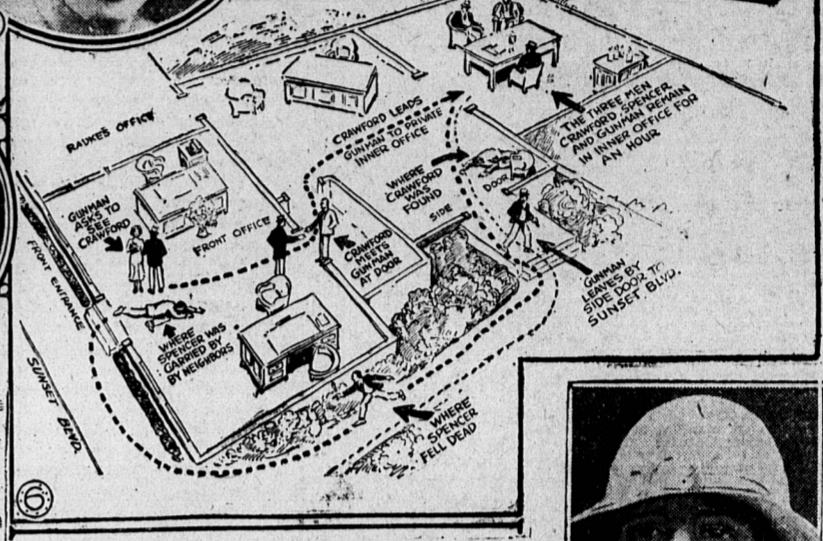
**HOW THEY MIGHT HAVE LOOKED TO BONAPARTE**

**FORMER PROSECUTOR ON TRIAL AS SEAYEE**

David H. Clark, former deputy district attorney of Los Angeles, and one-time candidate for a municipal judgeship, is now on trial charged with the murder of Hebert E. Spencer, magazine editor and newspaperman. He is also alleged to have killed Charles H. Crawford, prominent Los Angeles politician, both slayings occurring in Crawford's office, picture. No. 1 shows Clark. No. 2 is Jean Riley, a witness, who is said to have seen the slayer fleeing. No. 3 is Lucille Fisher, Crawford's secretary who admitted the slayer to the office. 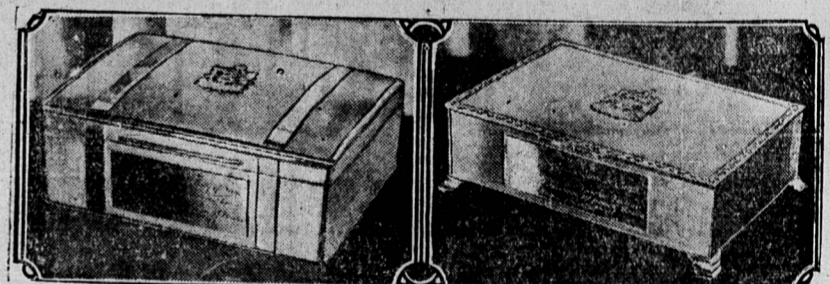
**WINS SHOOT PRIZE**
