**Must remove sugar Bowls from tables**

OTTAWA, Jan. 28—(CP)—The Wartime Prices and Trade Board ruled today that hotels, restaurants and other catering establishments must remove all sugar bowls from their tables "and serve sugar only in reasonable quantities when asked for by their clients."

"They will, of course, under no circumstances sell sugar to employees or the public and may serve it only with meals the order said. Specifically the order applies to hotels, restaurants, cafes, tea shops, inns, drug stores, coffee shops, staff dining rooms, clubs regularly serving meals, school feeding centres, canteens and other places of refreshment open to the public." Residential establishments and institutions were warned they must

follow the provisions of the general rationing order. It designated residential establishments as boarding houses, apartment houses serving meals, residential hotels, hostels, nursing homes and boarding schools. Institutions were described as including hospitals, sanatoria, convalescent homes, work houses, infirmaries, asylums, jails and reformatories.  
 Rationing provisions, the notice said may be relaxed for patients in such institutions "where it is considered advisable for medical reasons."

**Make big name In war effort**

Canadian Press War Correspondent SOMEWHERE IN ENGLAND, Jan. 28—(CP)—Royal Canadian Engineers are making a big name for themselves doing highly secret engineering jobs which contribute immensely to Britain's war effort. Recently a detachment on a tunnelling company, R.C.E., completed a vital task in the Scottish Highlands. No other construction group in Britain could do the job. The Sappers from a company commanded by Maj. Colin Campbell of Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., were brought in when everything else failed and by working day and night they finished the huge job in six months.

The detachment was commanded by Lieut. M. H. Hoeking of Kirkland Lake, Ont., and practically all of the men were from mining camps of Ontario and Manitoba. Among the Sappers on the last shift were D. Brown of New Glasgow, N.S., and D. L. Drummond of Ottawa.
