NEWEST NOTES OF SCIENCE

No point in Cuba is more than 40 miles distant from the sea.

When gas leaks in a room it causes a new electric alarm to be sounded.

The Mexican district of Pachuca is the world's greatest silver producer.

The head of a new tooth brush is pivoted to its handle for use at any angle.

Germany has opened a permanent exhibition of engineering equipment in Berlin.

A new tent for beach bathers is made of a single piece of material and folds compactly.

Poland has about 18,567,000 acres of forests, of which the government owns 6,429,000 acres.

Approximately 1,000,000,000 cubic feet of manufactured gas are used annually in the world.

Nearly two thirds of the residents of Finland are engaged in farming either directly or indirectly.

Discarded safety razor blades can be used in a pencil sharpening machine patented by a Californian.

Having 53.6 sets for every 1000 inhabitants, Sweden leads all European countries for radio reception.

London police have developed a system by which finger prints can be transmitted by wireless to all parts of the world.

Cups mounted on endless belts are used to propel in either direction a motor boat invented by a St. Louis man.

Italy has more than 1600 kilometers of electric transmission lines carrying current at a tension of 100,000 or more volts.

A new telegraphing machine can transmit 1000 words a minute and is so nearly automatic that an inexperienced man can use it.

The British island of St. Vincent is the world's only commercial source of arrowroot, producing about 3,000,000 pounds a year.

A clamp has been invented to enable a tooling machine to tap for current without interfering with the passage of cars beneath it.

A plant in Germany is making 100 tons of synthetic motor fuel from coal daily and expects to expand this to 3000 tons a day next year.

The United States is the world's largest consumer of tapioca and similar substances, importing more than 100,000,000 pounds annually.

Work has been begun near Seville on the airport that will be the terminal for the proposed airship service linking Spain and Argentina.

A plant has been established at Baltimore for making a pure white paint pigment from titanium dioxide, extracted from a titanium-iron ore.

Germans have developed an endless tread tractor on which the chain on each side passes over the wheels without any intermediary supporting rollers.

An electric motor agitates four rubber pads in a massaging machine invented by an Indianapolis man to treat the scalp and promote the growth of hair.

Through the introduction of technical experts from Europe the leather production of Argentina has been increased in quantity and improved in quality.

An ignition device for smudge pots has been patented by a California inventor, operating automatically when the air temperature falls to a set degree.

Claimed to be the fastest in the world, a new method of sending messages from Newfoundland to the Azores will be able to handle ten messages at a time.

A Vermont inventor has patented apparatus for cooling milk with which water is sprayed around the necks of cans, flowing down the outside in a thin film.

Because the tools he used affect the shape of a man's hand a German criminologist claims to be able to tell a man's occupation by studying his finger bones.

Propelled by hand, a machine invented by a New York state man to cut bushes out of the ways of paths is effective enough to cut down corn stalks or sugar cane.

Printed in Braille embossed characters, a French magazine instructs blind persons in the construction of radio apparatus and gives them the latest radio news.

To keep the air in residences at a healthy humidity the year around an air washing system that can be connected to the main water supply system has been invented.

Although Sweden's iron ore fields have been worked since the Thirteenth century they still are believed to contain more than 275,500,000 tons of high grade ore.

A United States patent has been granted the Hungarian inventor of a device using the exhaust gases of internal combustion engines to blow a flame extinguishing powder on fires.

Opening or closing one pair of swinging garage doors that are equipped with a new device causes the other doors to open or close at the same time, a spring holding both in place.

An Austrian has developed a 12 horsepower motorcycle engine that makes more than 14,000 revolutions a minute and is claimed to use only half the fuel customary to engines of that power.

Since the government assumed control of seal in Alaska in 1910 their number has increased about 500 per cent and the government controlled herd includes about 85 per cent of the world's fur seals.

New South Wales has joined the other states in a scheme by which \$100,000,000 of Australian funds will be spent for road building in ten years, the states adding 75 per cent to the amounts they receive.

Durability of paint is tested in a short time at the United States Bureau of Standards by subjecting samples to alternating conditions produced by rays from carbon arc lamps, water sprays and ozonized air.

Surrounded by double walls of lead wood and felt with a vacuum between them and resting on pillars of concrete, wood and horsehair, the world's most silent room has been built in Holland for scientific purposes.

Eight vegetables first raised in the United States by Indiana, beans, corn, peppers, pumpkins, squashes, tomatoes and sweet potatoes, new produce more valuable crops than 24 important imported vegetables.

After almost ten years of research by a government board a plant in Saskatchewan where fuel briquettes have been made for their production on a commercial scale by private interests.

Gloves with webs between the fingers to increase swimmers' speed have been patented by a Californian.

Efforts are being made at experiment stations to increase the cotton production of French West Africa.

A new pipe cleaner for smokers is made of metal, resembles a fountain pen and can be carried in a pocket.

A theatre is planned for London in which plays will be produced only for the benefit of radio audiences.

A camera that can take 20 pictures at one loading has been invented that can be carried in a policeman's club.

With its output steadily increasing, Columbia now is producing about one half of the world's supply of platinum.

Surf boards on which figures of horses are mounted have been designed to add thrills to the sport of using them.

Stock Exchange Has Busy Day

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—A "victory boom" in celebration of the election of Herbert Hoover to the presidency developed with the tap of the bell on the New York Exchange today, and before the day was over stocks had advanced from a point or so to 15 points under the tremendous urge of widespread public buying.

It was the second biggest day in the history of the exchange, sales having aggregated 4,894,670 shares, which compares with the previous record of 5,652,790 established on June 12.

From the very start of the market until its close, sentiment cheerfully enthusiastic, with the "bear party" in full flight. It could hardly have been said that the election result was a surprise in the financial district, the betting odds for one thing, having indicated a sweeping victory for Mr. Hoover.

But even the odds did not fully foreshadow the landslide which occurred, and while some sort of a demonstration had been anticipated in the financial district, the market was more or less unprepared for the tremendous enthusiasm which developed when business opened, and persons throughout the country had the appreciation. The volume of trading was so large that stock exchange facilities were entirely incapable of handling it, and at one time the tickers were running 47 minutes behind the current sales on the floor.

New Equipment for C.N.R. Lines

MONTREAL, Nov. 8.—Extension of the operation of single room sleeping cars to run between other cities will follow the delivery of five of these cars for which orders were placed yesterday by the Canadian National Railways. It was stated this morning by Mr. H. H. Melanson, general passenger traffic manager of the National system. The single room sleeping car was first introduced into Canada by the Canadian National and when the cars were placed in operation on the eleven "clock night train out of these cities it was found necessary to extend them to the ten o'clock night train also.

The delivery of five more of this type of sleeping car by the Canadian Car and Foundry Co., will make it possible to extend the service of this type of car between Montreal and Quebec and between Toronto and Ottawa where the single room sleepers will be operated on night trains.

The order for five hundred refrigerators placed with the Eastern Car Company of New Glasgow includes 150 cars of special type for banana and fruit trade. These cars will be required in connection with the department of

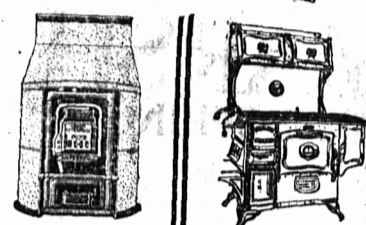
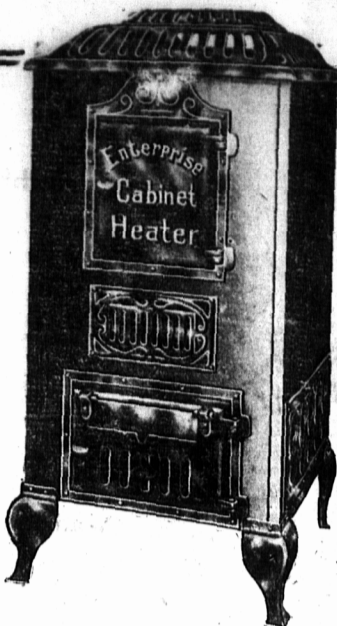

Indian Trade Agreement and are to operate in conjunction with the new fleet of steamers being placed in service from Canadian ports by Canadian National Steamship. Two of the new steamers from the western route will be equipped to carry one hundred thousand stems of bananas landing their fruit at Halifax during the winter months and at Montreal during the season of navigation on St. Lawrence. The 150 fruit refrigerator cars are equipped with divided wire basket ice bunkers, special consideration has been given to the ventilating as well as refrigeration while special provision has been made for heating the cars during the winter

Special type of floor racks and meat rails are being introduced in order that these cars may be used to the best advantage. Steel under frames and trucks will be used in the construction of these cars and special attention has been given to the quality of insulation. The other 350 refrigerator cars for special meat service will be similar in construction to those of the banana trade but will be equipped with brine tanks as each end of the cars.
