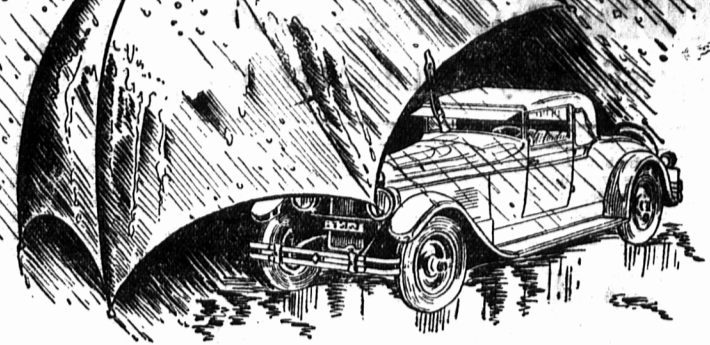
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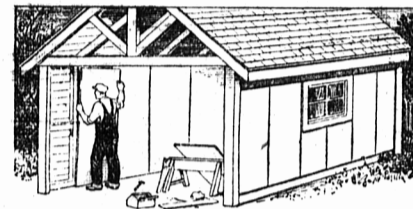


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N. S. Blueberry Industry Stimulated

HALIFAX, July 26. — Following the passage, at the last session of the Nova Scotia Legislature, of an Act encouraging the cultivation of blueberries, an organized effort has been placed behind the blueberry industry in this province. Blueberry associations are being formed throughout Nova Scotia, and the Provincial Government is co-operating with these associations in selecting areas best suited for the growth of the berries. These areas will be burned under Government supervision, and the cultivation will be favored with the best scientific knowledge and technical direction.

TWO FRIENDS STAGE PARTY TO FULFIL AMUNDSEN WISH

LOS ANGELES, CALIF., July 26 (AP).—Two friends of Roald Amundsen last night carried out a unique wish which the explorer, now lost in the Arctic, expressed on his last visit. A table was set for three. On one side sat John Murphy, Los Angeles attorney. Opposite him was Haakon H. Hammer, explorer and once a companion of Amundsen in his Arctic jaunts. At the place of honor was a vacant chair. It was draped with the Norwegian, colors and signified Amundsen's part in the affairs. There was nothing mournful about it. It was a birthday party. On

his last visit here Amundsen requested his two friends to commemorate his birthday, "regardless of where I am." He was born in Norway, July 16, 1872.
