MONARCHY OR REPUBLIC?

It was with some surprise that those present at a recent social gathering heard one of the speakers, after a glowing tribute to the United States and President McKinley, make the statement, "I am a republican, out and out."

It is sometimes loosely said that Britain is a republic in everything but the name. This statement is very wide of the truth. Britain is not only a monarchy in name, but affords the best and truest exemplification of that form of government.

It is characteristic of a sound loyalty to our Sovereign and country, and it is in the interest of good government everywhere, that our press and those who undertake to influence the course of public opinion shall always inculcate a due regard and appreciation not only for our gracious Sovereign but for the monarchical institutions under which we live.

ISLANDERS ABROAD.

Many are the Islanders abroad to whom THE GUARDIAN pays its daily or weekly visits. Their names number hundreds on our relatively large and constantly growing subscription list.

We have here at home a small but densely populated community. The Baby Province of Canada, the Rhode Island of the Dominion, with its fifty four inhabitants to the square mile, has at home but about one half the population of either of our two largest Canadian cities, and our numbers at home increase but slowly.

The Islanders abroad are the product of our Island homes. They bear with them the impress of our honest and thrifty home life, our churches and our schools. They make good citizens wherever they go, and it is rarely indeed that we have to chronicle anything to the discredit of an Islander abroad.

In the factories of New England; in the great mercantile emporiums of Boston or Chicago; in agricultural pursuits in the middle and western states, in Manitoba or the Northwest; on the far Pacific coast as merchants, or mining operators, or conducting extensive fishery operations, we record their success and advancement from time to time.

It is creditable to the Islanders abroad that in most cases they long retain a love for their native Island and a close bond of sympathy with its people. Hundreds of them return yearly to revisit their former homes and renew old associations.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

Ottawa numbers its people yearly, with the result that it is found there has been an increase of 7,600 in the past four years. The total is now 55,386. The assessment shows a valuation of \$33,713,725.

General Hutton during a recent inspection of volunteers at Toronto directed attention to the fact that many of the men wore their hair too long. This criticism, coupled with the advice that their hair be trimmed at an early date, seems not to have been very cordially received.

Sir Oliver Mowat has been threatened with an attack of paralysis. The first intimation was a slight thickening of his speech from partial paralysis of the vocal chords.

Spain has made a formal claim by her commissioners in the Paris conference that the United States shall assume the Cuban debt, and the proposal has been promptly and decisively rejected.

There is fear that war may break out between Great Britain and France as a result of the Fashoda incident.

A threatened insurrection of the Maroons, a native tribe inhabiting the mountainous eastern section of Jamaica, is now exciting some alarm.

The Maroons have never been wholly subjugated and they have the sympathy of the large negro population, which is now very discontented. The immediate cause of the trouble is the arrest of two Maroon chiefs for trespass.

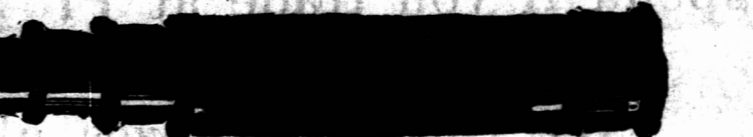
