BOOKSTACKS BEING INSTALLED—The bookstacks which arrived last week for the new Public Library are being assembled and placed in position in preparation for the transfer of the books to the new building from the Dadds Library. The twenty-one stacks each have six shelves. Eight have four compartments, six have five compartments, two have three compartments, and four have two compartments. With one exception the stacks hold two rows of books. The stacks will be arranged in the library in rows, and several feet apart in order to permit of easy access to the literature. The problem of lighting will be met with six portable electric lamps on chords, one of which will serve each double section. The stacks provide 2900 linear feet of packing space for the books. When the transfer from the Dadd library begins within the next few days it will be necessary to withhold all books on hand from circulation until they are installed in the new library.

New Archbishop Is Widely Esteemed

The following despatch from Edmonton appeared recently in the New Freeman. Consecration of the Most Rev. James Charles McGuigan, M. Ph., D.D., J.C.D., a native of Prince Edward Island, vicar General of the Archdiocese of Regina and Metropolitan of Saskatchewan, will probably be at the hands of Archbishop O'Leary in St. Joseph's Cathedral, Edmonton Alberta, shortly, it has been learned.

As Bishop of Charlottetown, Archbishop O'Leary ordained the young man to the priesthood nearly twelve years ago. Recognition of his diligent work on behalf of the Church, which has won him appointment as an archbishop at the age of thirty-six, also was responsible for being promoted to the highest rank of monsignorship as Pronothary Apostolic, in 1927. He was the youngest man to attain that rank in the Church.

Archbishop-elect McGuigan is a distinguished scholar and an accomplished linguist. During the ten years of his residence in Edmonton he had won himself large circle of friends. "I suppose it is in order for the mayor to congratulate a citizen who receives high honor such as this," said Mayor J. M. Douglas, of Edmonton, when he told the appointment. "Monsignor McGuigan certainly is to be congratulated upon his attainment of such an important office. He is a man I understand, very well qualified for such a post," the mayor added.

FATHER-SON BANQUET VERY SUCCESSFUL

"Mr. Toastmaster, Dads and Lads" was the opening salutation of the different speakers of the annual Father and Son Banquet held in the Y. M. C. A. last evening, with Mr. McLean, Chairman of the Boys' Work Committee, presiding.

The special speaker of the evening was Mr. John H. Geldart, travelling secretary of the Y. M. C. A., who addressed the fathers and sons on conditions in China, as far as they regard the youth. The Ladies' Auxiliary prepared a most sumptuous repast, which was heartily enjoyed by all.

The toast to the King and Empire was proposed by Master George McDougall and responded to by the singing of The King. The toastmaster, as chairman of the Boys' Work Committee, expressed himself pleased to see so many fathers and sons present. He expressed the hope of soon seeing a more modern Y. M. C. A. building in Charlottetown.

The ideal relationship between father and son should be found in the word "Comrade," but not such as exists between two boys, however. A problem in Charlottetown is the building of a good Y. M. C. A. building. The fathers could come and swim with the boys. A fellowship between father and son and between fathers can develop. A proper pool and gymnasium is necessary, and will partly solve the problem of environment.

The toast to the City was proposed by Master Jack McLean, and responded to by His Worship Mayor Prowse. His Worship stated that the work of the City Council is much more for the boys of today, the men of tomorrow, than for the men of today.

In proposing the toast to the Church, Mr. G. Brooks stated that the Church has a great deal of meaning to the individual. The desire of every normal person is to live the best life possible. Rev. C. N. Brown in responding to this toast, expressed the opinion that if a boy is to attend to the fullness of life, the church is absolutely essential. It leads him to the Father of his being, the only worth while goal.

Mr. J. A. Clark expressed the thanks of those present for the splendid banquet. The mothers are worthy of commendation as well as fathers and sons. The directors of the Y. M. C. A. appreciate the work of the Ladies' Auxiliary. \$100,000 would give Charlottetown a splendid Y. M. C. A. building. Mrs. Samuel Campbell spoke in return on behalf of the ladies.

S'Side Writer Discusses Disadvantage of Aeroplane Service. "N. E." in the Summerside Pioneer writes: "We cannot understand the attitude of the Charlottetown Board of Trade in agreeing that with the aeroplane in operation there would be no need for the late trip of the car ferry, and the train from Sackville to Tormentine, both now cancelled. So far as mail (light mail) is concerned, if that were the one thing necessary, the plane may answer the purpose. But the late crossing of the boat does much more than carry the mail, or did. She carried passengers and express and probably much more, while the aeroplane carries only the mails and that when the weather is fairly fine and not stormy.

"Every day there are passengers coming to Sackville by the late train, largely from the New England States, whence most of our Eastern people congregate, not to mention those passengers for the Island on the Ocean Limited. These must all stay overnight till next evening, before the crossing to the Island at loss of time and money, not to mention there may be urgent haste to get to the deathbed or the funeral of a relative or friend. East of Charlottetown; yes, and west of Summerside it is the same, a delay of 24 hours occurs in reaching their homes and on Saturday night, 48 hours.

"In our observation, here east, there are a great many rushing home to funerals and sick beds. Scarcely a family, here east, visited by the Angel of Death but has members in the New England States who naturally wish to be present at least before the funeral takes place; and it is quite a common thing to hold the funeral back one or two days for the arrival of the relatives. With the night trip of the boat those rushing passengers could make good time. Now they can't, with the aeroplane substituting for the boat.

A case in point. Last week a party died. His sister in New York desired to be at the funeral. They knew of the night trip of the boat and wired they would arrive at the home station Saturday night, getting into Charlottetown at 10:30 in the morning. When they got to Sackville Friday evening they learned the train to Tormentine connecting with the late crossing was cancelled, and instead of getting into Charlottetown on Saturday morning at 10:30 they did not reach there till on the regular train Saturday evening at 6:40.

Here was a dilemma; no train till Monday for the east and the corpse waiting unburied. It was a stormy night, but they managed to hire a sleigh in Charlottetown which in much difficulty with the drifts and cold, reached St. Peters. Here a gasoline trolley car, Tom Souris met them; but the trolley had its difficulties.
