MONTREAL, Sept. 7.—There were only 56 cattle, 96 calves, 368 hogs and 270 sheep and lambs for sale on the two Montreal livestock markets today.

Although sales were slow cattle prices were unchanged.

Calves held their own through the week with today's sales ranging from \$2.50 for grassers to \$6.50 for an odd top.

Lambs were steady to a shade easier at \$5.50 to \$5.75 for good ewes and wethers with culls and bucks out at \$3.50 and \$3.75.

Reduction In Directors Is Mooted

OTTAWA, Sept. 7.—Reduction in the number of directors of the Canadian National Railways may be recommended in the report of the transportation commission.

The present personnel of the board is seventeen with these directors coming from all parts of Canada.

With the railways to maintain their separate entities—and upon this point there has never been any doubt—there is a possibility that some kind of "umpire" body of three may be set up.

Emphasis will be laid on proposals for economies. A rumor that the commissioners might suggest improvement of the revenues of the railways by an increase in freight and passenger rates is given no credence.

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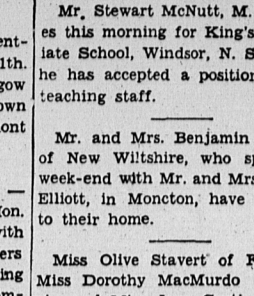
