The Markets

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 18.-Canadian egg markets unchanged today.

TORONTO-The situation on this egg market remains unchanged. Strictly fresh eggs continue firm with storage eggs dull.

MONTREAL-The local egg market is steady. Jobbing prices unchanged. Fresh eggs are selling to retailers at extras 55 cents, firsts 48 cents, seconds 39 cents and 48 cents are selling at extras 45 cents, firsts 41 cents, seconds 38 cents.

MONTREAL, Oct. 18.-Extreme dullness marked the export trade in grain here today owing to the fact that foreign bids were below local exporters views. The domestic cash grain trade was fair and quiet. Choice white handled grades sold for spring and winter wheat flour was of a limited character but prices were firm. An active trade was done in millfeed and the underdone to the market was firm. There was a fair demand for standard grades of roller oats and prices remained stationary.

Little business was done in butter but values were firmly maintained. Receipts were 744 packages. The undertone to the cheese market continued easier but there was no further change in prices. The demand was inactive. Receipts were 11,533 boxes. The egg market was moderately active and values for fresh and storage grades were firm. Receipts were 882 cases. Imported beans were in good demand. Choice white handled grades sold at \$4.50 to \$4.60 per bushel, ex store. A small trade was done in potatoes and prices were firm. New Brunswick Green Mountains were quoted at 80 cents per bag of 90 pounds, in bulk, with cobbles at 75 cents per bag, ex track, while Prince Edward Island Green Mountains best grade cobbles sold at 85 cents to 90 cents per bag of ninety pounds in bags, F O B Montreal.
