Annual Session of United Church

July 11th, to the 16th, inclusive have been selected as the dates for the annual session of the Maritime Conference Young People's Union of the United Church of Canada. The conference will convene in the Academy of Mount Allison, Sackville, N. B. This is the thirteenth annual gathering and each year the meetings have been growing in popularity and the program chosen for this conference will make it one of the best to be held yet. Arrangements for the conference have been made by the members of the Sub-executive Rev. W. D. F. Everett, President, Rev. T. D. F. Everett, Edmundston, President, Mr. Leonard Ferguson, Sackville, Associate President, Rev. W. W. Crowe, Port Hawkesbury, N. S. Treasurer, and Miss Sue Kennedy, Windsor Junction, Secretary.

Among the speakers in the conference will be Dr. Basil Mathews, Canadian Journalist and scholar, at present Professor of World Religions in the Boston University School of Theology, but recently assigned to accept a position in Union College, Vancouver, one of the Theological Colleges of the United Church of Canada. Mr. Mathews will deliver the Theme Address of the Conference. His subject being "Unfold Drama West of the Date-Line". Mr. Mathews has spent years of intensive travel in Europe, Asia Minor, Palestine, Egypt, West Africa, India, Ceylon, Canada and the United States. He has had repeated interviews with such leaders as Gandhi, Nehru, Tagore, and other prominent social workers and missionaries. He has written more than a score of books. His visit to the Maritimes is being greatly anticipated.

MORNING WORSHIP
The morning worship service of the conference will be conducted by Rev. Kenneth J. Beaton, D. D., of the United Church of Canada, and is at present Secretary to the Committee on Missionary Education of the United Church of Canada. He has spent fourteen years as a Missionary in China where he gave distinguished service and leadership in religious and educational fields.

McNaughton Says Call For Men Is "Insistent"

MONTREAL, June 8 (CP)—The call for men for the armed forces is "now immediate and insistent," Lt.-Gen. A. G. L. McNaughton, former commander of the Canadian Army Overseas, said here tonight.

In a speech prepared for delivery to the graduating class of Loyola College, Gen. McNaughton told the students they were launched on a great crusade which called for their highest endeavor.

He told them about the cause they were following and spoke of their opportunity as leaders. He said "nowhere is the need for leaders being fully satisfied" and never was there a time in Canadian history when leadership was more required.

The General added: "The call is for young men who are well stored with the lessons of the past, and alert and keen to grapple with the new problems that now present themselves — to study and assess them — to rationalize conflicting theories — to choose the proper course and to hold to it with will and purpose and self-sacrifice if need be."
