GRAHAM'S ROAD.—On Thursday evening Professor Ross addressed an Agricultural meeting in the New Hall at Graham's Road. This meeting was arranged for by Mr. Thomas Wigmore, Secretary of the Live Stock Breeders' Association of this district. A committee was formed and applied to the Federal Department of Agriculture for the services of a pure-bred boar, and they have since had the services of rams and pigs. They are now desirous of forming a Farmers' Institute and with that end in view asked Professor Ross to address them on this subject. Notwithstanding bad roads and an unfavorable evening there was upwards of one hundred present. Mr. James A. Campbell was appointed Chairman and introduced Professor Ross. He complimented them on their beautiful hall and then pointed out that only five institutes can be formed in an Electoral District and there were already three in the northern part of this territory, they would have to form a club of their own or join one of the other institutes. They decided to form their own club and, accordingly, a meeting will be held next Thursday to draw up a constitution and to appoint officers. Everyone interested is invited. Professor Ross proposed that this club when formed should take up the study of "Feeding and Care of Live Stock" and promised such assistance as the Department of Agriculture could give. He himself spoke of the care and feeding of Dairy Cattle and arranged a date for further discussion. Considerable discussion followed and the meeting closed with the singing of the National Anthem the meeting was brought to a close.

CANADA'S \$25,000,000 LOAN OVER-SUBSCRIBED IN LONDON MARKET.

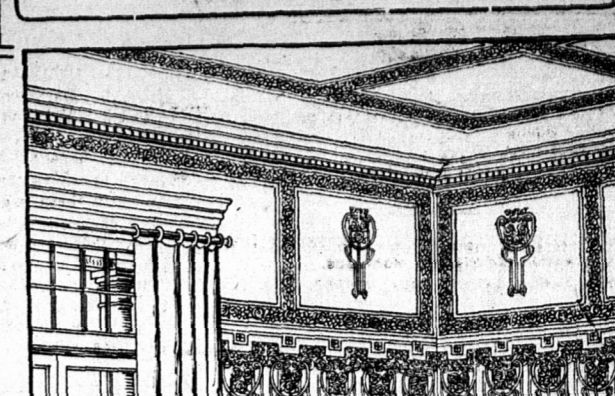
OTTAWA, April 16.—The Minister of Finance reports that the recent Canadian loan for \$25,000,000, floated in the London market, has met with a good reception, and has been oversubscribed by ten million. There were 4,814 separate applications for Dominion's bonds from the investing public, of which 3,552 were from small investors for amounts of from \$500 to \$2,500. The number of applicants makes a new record for Canadian loan, being about 2,000 in excess of those received in connection with any previous bond issue. The investing public of Great Britain evidently still regard a Canadian loan as a safe investment under present European conditions.

AMERICAN LINER'S STEWARD FORCE UNDER ARREST.

NEW YORK, April 16.—Seventy-seven men and women, practically the entire force of stewards and stewardesses aboard the American liner Kronland, were placed under arrest to-day by immigration officers and a warrant was served on the captain charging the Red Star line, owners of the vessel, with violation of the alien contract labour law. The entire complement of stewards and stewardesses—sixty-nine men and eight women—it was charged, had been brought in as passengers aboard the liner Finland last January from England. After their arrival, it is charged, the Red Star line transferred them, in accordance with a previous agreement, to the Kron-
