LONDON, May 4—(CP) Behind the exhibits in the Royal Treasures Coronation Exhibition, containing everything from Queen Elizabeth's mittens to a one-eyed velvet elephant toy of Prince Edward of Kent, lie many stories.

There is one that goes with the feathered hat of Henry VIII and the 11th sleepers of Anne Boleyn's Riding one day with his young Queen and his favorite courtier, Nicholas Bristowe, the King passed the manor of Agot St. Lawrence. The favorite admired it and asked whose it was.

"It is mine," said the King, "but now it shall be yours"—and to prove the good faith of the gift gave the young man the plumed hat he wore and made the Queen take off her embroidered shoes. Ever since that day the hat and shoes have descended from father to son with the estate.

Many more of the great houses of England and Scotland have loaned their royal relics, including a red-gold crown from the head of Mary Queen of Scots, the scarlet military coat in which Queen Victoria reviewed her troops, a drop of Charles I's blood taken from the scaffold and enclosed in a crystal locket, Charles II's love letters, Queen Anne's silver tea service, Edward VII's pigskin gloves, Queen Mary's fan and Princess Alexandra of Kent's gold rattle.
