Standing Field Crops Competition, 1923

CASH PRIZES FOR FIELDS OF OATS, WHEAT, BARLEY AND CERTIFIED SEED POTATOES

There will be competitions in the three counties, where there are five or more entries each for wheat and barley forty cents oats (from certified seed). The number of prizes, in each county, will be proportionate with the number of entries. Prizes will be paid according to the score for wheat and barley forty cents, oats and potatoes fifty cents a point will be paid for each point of the score above eighty.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. A field of oats shall consist of at least five acres of wheat and barley three acres of certified seed potatoes two acres.
2. An entry fee of \$1.00 shall be charged for the first and fifty cents of each additional entry of grain and \$1.00 for each entry of potatoes.
3. The entry fee shall accompany the application.
4. Entries shall be made to the Department of Agriculture, Charlottetown not later than August 25th, 1923.
5. Competitors should notify the Department of Agriculture at least one week previous to date on which harvesting will begin.
6. The judging will be done by representatives of the Department of Agriculture.
7. Competitors are requested to note the following requirements for standing fields of oats only. The field must be seeded with (a) registered Banner Oats, or (b) Seed from a field which had been sown with registered seed and inspected and approved while growing, or (c) seed from fields that have been two or more years in the competition and have scored not less than 24 1/2 out of 25 points for purity and approved by the Department of Agriculture.

"But I thought you must like them. You go to so many with Gwendolyn," I answered, stung to sudden anger.

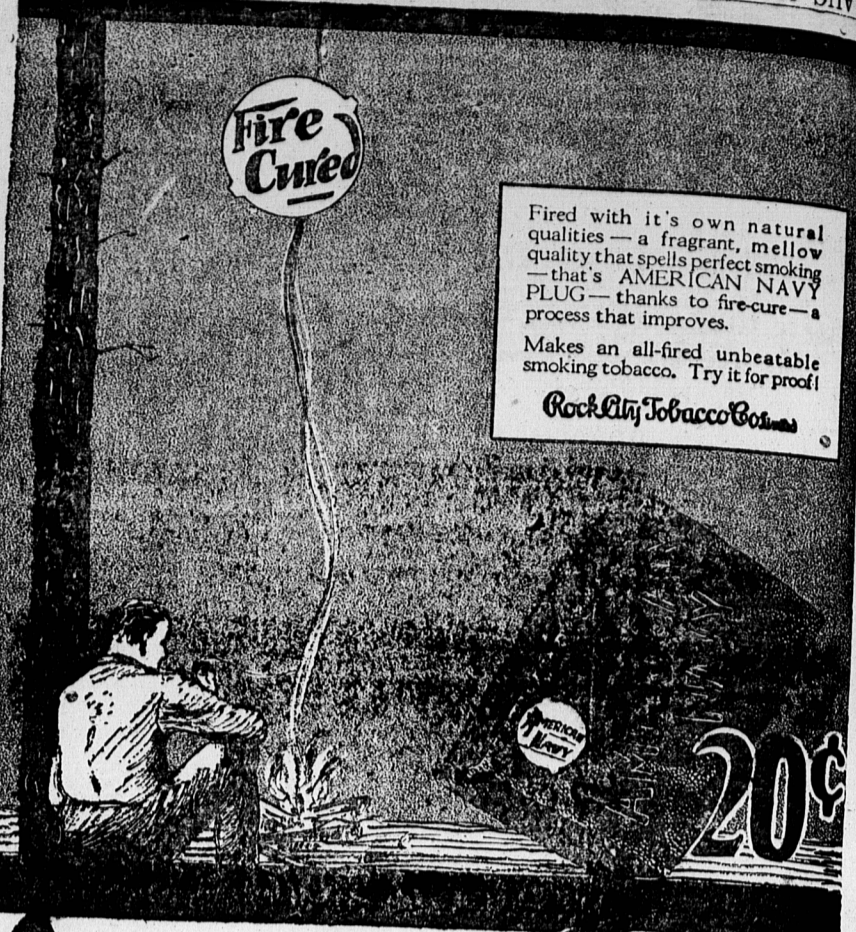
"I never hear the music. I like to have people sit and admire her and to be there when old Nardonski bows to her," he answered.

The Russell Divorce Appeal

LONDON, Aug. 17.—Two generations must pass before the arrival of the final stage of the Russell divorce case of which the majority of people hoped they had heard the last when Mrs. Russell's appeal against the divorce decree awarded to her husband was dismissed. It will be remembered that the Hon. John Russell, son of Lord Amthill, married during the war. The marriage was not a happy one and when a son was born the question of his parentage was raised.

Divorce proceedings were raised by Mr. Russell and sensational evidence of such a nature that even the English Sunday papers could not publish it was heard. The jury disagreed and the case came before the Courts again last spring, when fresh evidence was introduced by Mr. Russell, who then was granted a decree. The question, however, of the small boy's succession to the Amthill peerage cannot be challenged until after the death of the baby's grandfather and father, when, in the natural course of

events he will become Lord Amthill. Although proceedings may be taken for a declaration of legitimacy, it is a principle of English law that no person may bring an action for illegitimizing a child. The matter can only be raised as subsidiary to some other issue, such as succession to lands or a title. Baby Russell's status, therefore, will not be questioned until the Amthill peerage case is brought before a committee for privileges of the House of Lords—perhaps some fifty years hence.

For the purpose of this future action it may be necessary that proceedings should now be taken for the perpetuation of evidence as was done in the Poullet peerage case fought 20 years ago. In this case it was alleged that the child born to the first wife of the sixth Earl six months after his marriage in 1849 was not the child of Lord (then Mr.) Poullet, the wife having confessed that the person was another person. In 1881 a suit was brought to perpetuate evidence. Fifty-four years after the birth of the first child a son of Lord Poullet by a later marriage preferred a claim to the title on the death of his father, and the committee for privileges upheld it.

KENT'S HOLE

A cavern in the vicinity of Torquay, Eng., famous not only for its relics of primitive man, but also for its remains of extinct animals is known as Kent's Hole. Although the existence of this cave had been known from time immemorial it did not attract the attention of scientists until 1825. Excavations were carried on by Pengelly from 1865 to 1880, at a cost of nearly £2,000 and yielded results of the highest importance to the science of anthropology.

There were found flint tools of the Palaeolithic Age and implements of bone, such as needles, awls and harpoons. The animal remains discovered comprised those of the lion, hyena, bear, wolf, fox, rhinoceros, mammoth, Irish elk and reindeer showing that those animals once lived in Britain and were contemporaneous with man of the Stone Age.
