TO RUSH PARLIAMENT

OTTAWA, Ont., May 6.—Full speed ahead has been ordered for the remainder of the session and members predict that if the budget is not too contentious progress will come by the end of the month.

Parliament will sit every day but Sunday from this onward and inasmuch as most of the departments have already run the gauntlet of amendments to supply and have introduced their estimates it is anticipated that business will now stride through.

SUGAR REFINERY REDUCES PRICES

NEW YORK, May 5.—The Federal Sugar Refining Company today reduced its quotations of refined sugar ten points to the basis of \$4.40 per pound for fine granulated, the lowest price in more than four years. The decline was due to the persistent weakness of raws.

Vickers Launch Last Ship Under Contract

MONTREAL, May 6.—At the launching of the Norwegian cargo liner "Topalstjord" from the yards of the Canadian Vickers, Limited at Massonneuve here this afternoon, P. L. Miller the manager, said that it constituted the 23rd launching of a freighter from the company's yards while over a hundred vessels had taken the water since the plant was installed in January, 1915.

Today's launching, it was added, concluded the work of the Canadian Vickers yards in construction there being no more orders in sight and the present staff of 1400 men would be cut down to a few hundred to take care of repair work. The launching was witnessed by members of the Federal cabinet, Commons and Senate.

Disarmament Of First Importance

LONDON, May 6.—The necessity of German disarmament was placed as first in importance by Premier Lloyd-George announcing in the House today the result of the Supreme Council's deliberations on reparations and other questions at issue with Germany.

Germany who is defaulting her disarmament obligations was placed first by the Premier, because there was an impossibility of re-appearing of freedom of movement there is no guarantee of freedom and peace in Europe. Premier Lloyd-George argued the plan of the Supreme Council as adopted was fair and workable.

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IN MEMORIAM

CHARLES OSTRIDGE

There passed peacefully away at his old home in Pisiquid, on April 15th an old and respected resident in the person of Charles Ostridge at the age of 86. He was enjoying his usual good health until within a few days of his demise when an Angel of Death entered and claimed him as his own. He was attended to in his dying hours by his pastor Rev. A. P. McLellan who administered the last rites of the Holy Catholic Church of which he was a devoted member. He leaves to mourn besides a sorrowing widow, one son Charles on the home, and two daughters Mrs. Donald Steel, Savage Harbor, and Mrs. Augustine Walker, Johnstons River, also twenty-four grand children and one great-grand son. His two sons, Anslem and John predeceased him a few years ago. His funeral Sunday to St. Andrew's church was largely attended despite the bad condition of the roads. The pall bearers were: Allan J. McDonald, John D. McDonald, Francis McDonald, John W. Jay, Frank Handrahan, and Andrew McKenzie. "May his soul rest in Peace."

NEW DIOCESE TO BE PROPOSED

The Synod of the Diocese of Nova Scotia will meet in Halifax, May 17. The following resolution will be moved by Archdeacon Draper:

"Whereas, in consideration of the great development of the Maritime Provinces and the growth of the Church therein it is desirable that there should be increased Episcopal supervision.

Resolved, That this Synod request the House of Bishops of the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada to sanction the formation of a new Diocese, consisting of Prince Edward Island, and the Counties of Cumberland, Colchester, Pictou, Antigonish and Guysboro, said new Diocese constituted as soon as the sum of \$— be secured toward Episcopal endowment.

SINN FEIN ADOPTED GRUESOME PLAN TO LURE POLICE TO AMBUSH

Dublin, May 6.—The killing of a sergeant and seven constables who were ambushed Wednesday, near Rathmore, County Kerry, it was officially stated today, was caused by a ruse employed by Sinn Feiners, who killed a man named Sullivan, 80 years of age, placed the body in the road and then telephoned to the police to recover it.

The police patrol sent to get the body was attacked by the Sinn Feiners, the statement said. The body of Sullivan bore a label designating him as a spy and informer, which the authorities declare was untrue. Sullivan received a small war office pension for the loss of a son, killed in the war.

HOTEL CHANGED HANDS

SASKATOON, May 5.—The Empire hotel, one of the largest hotels in the city, has been purchased from the Colonial Investment and Loan company of Toronto by the Empire Hotel company at a figure of \$125,000.
